

Stefansson at Chautauqua

Famous Explorer Comes on Second Night With His Remarkable Story of the Polar Regions



The cardinal lecture event of the week for all Chautauquans comes on the second night when Ellison-White presents Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the famous Arctic explorer and discoverer of the "blonde Eskimo," for the first time on the Chautauqua platform.

Rear Admiral Robert E. Peary, discoverer of the North Pole, said of him: "Stefansson has taken the white man's brains into the Polar regions, and has evolved a way to make himself absolutely self-sustaining. He could have lived in the Arctic fifteen and a half years, just as easily as five and a half years. By combining great natural physical ability with hard, practical common sense, he has accomplished what he has accomplished, and made an absolute record."

Stefansson's lecture has thrilled audiences everywhere. He has a remarkable story to tell and unusual ability in presenting its fascinating details graphically.

OREGON STATE NEWS

Clyde (Red) Rupert, who was convicted of taking \$15,000 in Liberty bonds from the Northwestern National bank of Portland, where he was employed as a special police officer will complete his three-year sentence at the state prison early in July. A federal officer will at once take him to McNeil island to begin a five-year term on the same charge.

Governor Olcott on Friday announced his appointments for the state board of aeronautics, created by the legislature of this year. The appointees are: Archie F. Roth, Portland, for five-year term; Walter E. Lees, La Grande, for four-year term; L. B. Hickman, Portland, three-year term; Leo H. DeVaney, Roseburg, two-year term; Floyd Hart, Medford, one-year term.

Two fatal accidents out of a total of 340 industrial casualties were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the week ending June 16. The fatalities were Harry E. Eckenstein, a warehouseman of Medford, and Frank Doerg, a logger of Coehran.

A statement issued by Sam A. Koser, secretary of state, shows that a total of \$916,635.65 has been paid out in educational aid to Oregon ex-service men under an act passed by the people in 1919. A total of 5545 former soldiers, sailors or marines have taken advantage of the act.

The state highway commission has asked the public service commission for a rehearing relative to a desired change of plans for the \$75,000 overhead crossing on the Southern Pacific between Eugene and Springfield. A permanent earth fill approach instead of a trestle approach is desired. The rehearing has been granted.

According to announcement by E. E. Elliott, state director of vocational education, home making courses will be in operation the coming school year in the schools of Ashland, Cottage Grove, Forest Grove, Salem and Ontario.

O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, who as a member of the state board of control, will have something to say about the location of the new training school for boys, wants it placed at a remote distance from the state penitentiary where no possible influence may reach it from the latter institution. He would have the school away from Salem if necessary to meet that condition.

The Association Oil company in reporting to the secretary of state shows that it sold in Oregon during May 733,005 gallons of gasoline and 76,298 gallons of distillate.

Thirty-two boys who are inmates of the state training school passed the recent eighth grade examinations.

The following decisions have been rendered by state supreme court: Bronson vs. Boggs; appeal from Malheur county; damage suit growing out of controversy over water rights. Opinion by Chief Justice Burnett; Judge Dalton Biggs affirmed. Rehearing ordered in Bottig vs. Polsky. Petition for rehearing denied in Meada vs. Churchill.

The Chewaucan Land & Cattle company has filed with the state engineer an application for a permit to appropriate water from Long creek a tributary of Sican river for the irrigation of 500 acres of land in Lake county. Other applications have been filed as follows:

By Walter A. Woodard of Cottage Grove, covering the appropriation of twenty-one second feet from Coast fork of Willamette river for use in fluming lumber. The cost of this development, located in Lane county is \$30,000.

By Patrick Reddy of Ashwood, Or., covering the appropriation of two second feet from John Day river for irrigation of twenty-eight acres in Jefferson county.

By John Conley of Myrtle creek, covering the construction of the Conley reservoir for the storage of water from Frozen creek, for irrigation of a small tract in Douglas county.

By J. F. Houston of Roberts covering the appropriation of water from springs to be stored in Pringle Flat reservoir, to be used for irrigating 140 acres near Roberts in Creek county. The cost of this water system is estimated at approximately \$2500.

By C. W. Dent of Plush, covering the appropriation of water from MacDowell creek for irrigation of a ten-acre tract in Lake county.

By J. C. Hunter of Grants Pass, covering the construction of the Hunter reservoir for the storage of water from Hunter creek, tributary of Applegate river, for irrigation of ten acres in Josephine county.

By A. E. Gram of Kerby, covering the appropriation of water from Horse slough and Horse spring for irrigation of a one-acre tract in Josephine county at a cost of approximately \$500.

By J. E. Mansfield of Williams, covering the appropriation of water from Williams creek for irrigation of a two-acre tract in Josephine county.

By C. D. Ramsdell of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from an un-named spring for domestic water supply in Multnomah county.

By William Head of Applegate, covering the appropriation of water from Big Applegate river for irrigation of ten acres in Jackson county.

By Florence Hogoboom of Joseph, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for irrigation of fifteen acres in Wallowa county.
