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HAY GROWERS ORGANIZE

The Oregon Hay Growers are off to a flying start as the results of their meeting at Hermiston last Thursday. More than 65 per cent of the required amount of hay was signed at the meeting and everybody who attended was enthusiastic for its success. The plan has the complete endorsement and hearty cooperation of local financiers and merchants.

The plan of the Oregon Co-operative Hay Growers is in all essential details the same as the Oregon Wheat Growers. It is a pooling plan, non-profit, non-stock concern, is a long-time contract, and has the usual fundamental features which have made co-operative marketing successful for the last ten years. The plan was prepared by Dr. Hector McPherson of the United States Bureau of Market at Corvallis in cooperation with the local directors. The directors who have been carrying on the work preparing the contract will continue to act until the four thousand acres required in Morrow and Umatilla counties are signed up. As soon as this is done permanent directors will be elected, a manager secured, and the concern opened for business. The campaign is now being rushed in both counties and it is fully anticipated that within ten days the organization will be opened for this season's business.

It is anticipated that the organization will expand to take in the Crook and Deschutes hay-growing districts, as well as Baker, Malheur, and Union counties as fast as arrangements can be made at this end.

NEW WHEAT DISEASE APPEAR

Two new wheat diseases are expected to develop in Oregon this year as a result of importations of seed wheat from Australia. They are described in the following communication from the Plant Pathology Dept. of the College. Keep them in mind and if any suspicious symptoms show up in your wheat, inform the County Agent's office at once:

Flag Smut

Symptoms: Black stripes running lengthwise in the leaf blades and sheaths are typical of flag smut. These black stripes are due to the spore produced by the fungus. The disease is commonly more injurious to the upper leaves of the plant. The stems are also infected to some extent. Infected plants are usually more or less dwarfed and they rarely head out or produce seed. Commonly all the stalks on a diseased plant are smutted, but occasionally one or more stalks show no infection.

Take-All

Symptoms: Badly dwarfed plants occurring in distinct patches of varying size and shape or singly among the healthy plants, are typical of the disease. These symptoms first become evident in the spring after growth of the healthy plants is well started.

Diseased plants show the following characteristic symptoms: (1) dwarfing and, a little later, (2) abnormal dark green coloration of the fall leaves, (3) dying of outer leaves and fall tillers and browning of crown and roots, (4) excessive development of spring tillers, or (5) some plants may be killed entirely while in the dwarfed stage. Badly infested fields may have only a few healthy plants, but where the infestations is slight, it may be very difficult to find the more or less isolated diseased plants scattered among the healthy ones. More commonly, patches or spots of diseased plants show up here and there without regard to the type or condition of the soil. Most of the plants in these spots are diseased and stunted, thus giving a sharply defined margin to the area. In spots due to local unfavorable soil conditions, on the other hand, all the plants usually decrease in height rather gradually from the edge toward the center.

GRAIN GROWERS SIGNING WITH OREGON WHEAT GROWERS

Following favorable action by the executive committee of the county farm bureau on the Oregon Co-operative Wheat Grower Association, organizer Noel began the work of gathering membership in the county. In order to give the association assistance in getting the proposition before all of the interested farmers in a way that they might be familiar with the objects and plans of the organization, the farm bureau committee on marketing cooperated with Mr. Noel in arranging meetings of the wheat growers in several of the communities during the past four weeks. After explaining the matter to the growers and answering questions, the organizer passed out contracts and asked each man to study the thing over at home and be prepared to act later when he called at the farm.

As a result of this activity a considerable number of farmers have become members of this big cooperative marketing organization which promises to control a considerable portion of the wheat of the state this year though so recently launched. P. Tensen of Nyssa, county chairman of the farm bureau marketing committee was the first man to sign, thus showing his faith in cooperative marketing and the wheat growers organization. The work of signing members is still in progress. Anyone who has not had an opportunity to meet the organizer may get in touch with him by writing to him at Weiser, Idaho. The Oregon association is affiliated with similar organizations for the states of Idaho, Washington and Montana making up the Northwest association which has a general manager. There will be no other cooperative organizations for marketing wheat in this territory.
