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A HOSPITAL'S WORTH

What is a hospital worth to a city? What is one worth to the individual citizen?

These are questions which Ontarians do not ask themselves, because they have a hospital at hand.

But if there were no hospital in Ontario what would each individual consider a fair exchange for the feeling of security which results from the presence of an institution such as the Holy Rosary Hospital in a community like this?

In a recent issue of the Corvallis-Gazette Times there appeared an editorial upon this very subject. Corvallis has just had completed a hospital adequate for its needs, and the Gazette-Times declared that one of the prominent citizens summed up the case of the worth of a hospital to the individual in words something like this:

"Because Corvallis had no adequate hospital when my wife took sick, it cost me \$250 more for an operation than was necessary, than it would otherwise have done. I arrived at these figures by having the doctor keep track of the cost of

transportation to Portland, and the further fact that she had to remain in the hospital longer than if she had been in one here at home. This was necessary because of the feeling that she was not strong enough to make the trip home. Had she been in Corvallis she would have been several days less in the hospital than she was."

But this is putting it on a mere dollar and cents basis, the lowest possible terms. Just think of the fact that because of the hospital here many lives have been saved that otherwise might have been lost, and of the possibility, yes the certainty that many others will likewise be saved. And no one knows who will be the next one to be saved.

At some time every family in Ontario has, or will have need for the hospital. When they need it, it is appreciated. But it must be kept going all the time, and at all times the people owe it to themselves to take an interest in its welfare.

Then there is the public benefit which the hospital gives the city. It brings to Ontario annually hundreds of people who otherwise would not come here; relatives and friends of those who are the patients. These friends stay at our hotels, eat at our restaurants, visit our stores and buy supplies ere they return to their homes. Thus directly does the hospital show direct returns to the city.

Ontario has reason to be proud of the Holy Rosary hospital. It has a standard training school for nurses. It has a well equipped surgery, excellent accommodations for patients, a well appointed maternity ward; a nurses home and all of the features that such an institution should have.

While the hospital is the property of a private corporation, the Dominican Sisters of Ontario, it is in every other sense a public institution. It ministers to the sick of every faith, of every creed of every color. Rich and poor are alike. None are turned away because of lack of funds. The charitable work done there is seldom heard of—yet it is an every day event.

From the abundance with which some of our citizens are blessed surely there is something which they can, to their own good, contribute to the work of the Sisters, to the blessing of their fellow men.

The sisters, through their Mother Superior, urge the people of Ontario to take an interest in their work. To become better acquainted with their aims and purposes, and to have a part in the effort to alleviate the ill which come to the institution every day. It should be deemed a privilege to have a part in this work. It is something that will add more to the joy and happiness of those who give, thus they will be aiding others in a most practical manner.

To bring about a closer co-operation between the community and the hospital it has been proposed that a hospital auxiliary be established, as these have been established all over the country during the past year. The idea is a good one for only by such a means can the continued co-operation which is necessary be maintained. Everyone interested, not in the hospital alone, but in the betterment of Ontario, should be enrolled in that association.

RIGHT CANNING PROCESS WILL KEEP CIDER SWEET

Product Said to Keep Natural Flavor and Aroma For Indefinite Time by New Method

Sweet cider may be canned so as to keep its natural flavor and aroma indefinitely, by a method worked out at the Hort products laboratory of the Oregon Agricultural college experiment station. The cooked jelly taste is entirely absent.

The apples are collected, sorted to all sound ones, and then cleaned and piled up to sweat, which develops an exquisite aroma in the skins. The sound fruits only are then ground up with a grater. Spoiled fruits spoil the flavor and render the juice watery.

With hydraulic presses an average of three gallons from each bushel of fruit is obtained. The juice is pumped direct from the press into a receiving tank and strained thru a coarse cloth or burlap to remove pulp. It is then run through a centrifuge of the type used in clarifying milk.

The juice is then put into the sterilizer, which may be a black tin or copper coil in a tank of water which is to be held at an even temperature of 160, Fahrenheit. Good thermometers and careful watching are essential.

The product next goes into sterilized plain tins which are sealed at once and processed at 160 degrees—no more—for 30 minutes or more. Time is counted after tank thermometer records 160, which must not be exceeded. After a short period of cooling, the cans are ready for market or storage.

If sterilizing the juice causes too much air in it, the cans are run through an exhaust box at 160 for about five minutes.
