In Eastern states the one-room one central consolidated school, where one or at most two grades only are taught in one room.

North Dakota with a population of 140,000 less than that of Oregon has more than 300 of these consolidated rural schools. Indiana has more that a thousand. Iowa has built more than 300 of them in the last six years. Minnesota is building them at the rate of more than thirty annually. But Oregon does not yet know just what a consolidated rural school is.

Of course it can be said that bad roads and mountain steeps make the transportation of children to central schools difficult; and so they In some cases children cannot be reached at all. But more than half of the children who are being but half educated in our little oneroom schools could be given as good an education through the grades as is given to city school children by bringing them together in groups large enough to make is possible to grade the school.


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
