Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Peterson and daughter Katherine are spending the week in Boise attending the Fair.

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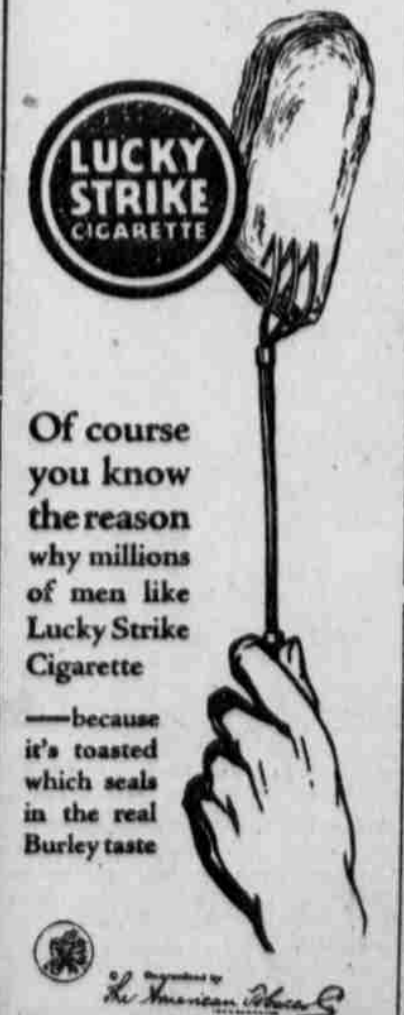
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
