A stock and judging contest will be held between the Inter-mountain Institute of Weiser and the Ontario teams some time this fall or early winter. Prizes will be offered to the school winning in each contest.

The class in animal husbandry and the advanced agriculture class will go to Weiser this week to attend the stock show in connection with the round-up.

The first football game of the season will be played in Ontario Friday afternoon, October 7, with Weiser Institute. The boys have been working hard and are expected to put up a good fight.
