MONTHLY REPORT OF THE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT For the Period of September 5 to October 1, 1921.

The major projects for the period of this report were in poultry, drainage and marketing. Some time was devoted to farm records, crop improvement, fairs, and to conferences with official visitors.

Poultry
The first meetings of a series of demonstrations in poultry keeping were given during the month. The instructional work at these meetings was conducted by Herbert Cosby, Extension specialist in poultry husbandry and consisted of a lecture on the principles of selection of high laying hens, followed by a demonstration of culling into three classes: culls, medium or commercial layers, and high layers or breeders. Three such meetings were held, one each at Adrian, Cairo and Oregon Slope.

Plans were made with Mr. Cosby for the establishment of a poultry demonstration on farm and the holding of regular demonstration meetings on timely topics for the benefit of the poultry industry. Arrangements were also made to extend the benefits of the culling demonstrations to the Vale and Brogan-Jamieson sections with the assistance of Graham Park and arrangements made for meetings at those points in October.

Drainage
One drainage demonstration meeting was held at Vale for the purpose of inspecting the drainage and alkali removal experiments in progress on the tract established there earlier in the year, under the direction of the Oregon Experiment Station, and to witness a demonstration of the sluicing method of drainage canal construction worked out by W. W. Johnston and Percy Pervious in connection with this work during the summer. The meeting was attended by 29 persons representing seven or eight contemplated drainage projects. Following the sluicing demonstration given by Mr. Pervious talks were given by Director Jardine of the Oregon Experiment Station, F. L. Ballard of the Extension Service, and other members of the party.

The agent made preliminary arrangements toward the close of the period covered by this report, for the organization of four drainage projects.

Marketing
Work in this department consisted of a continuation of effort toward the organization of the Oregon Co-operative Wheat Growers Association and the Pacific Cooperative Poultry Producers Association, in the county along lines reported heretofore. Assistance was given the wheat growers association in planning its membership campaign. The organizer succeeded in signing up approximately fifty percent of the principal growers during the month. Assistance was given in making preliminary arrangements for a membership drive early in October for the poultry association, the drive to be made by teams consisting of one Malheur County business man with his automobile, one Caldwell business man as solicitor, and one or more local poultrymen as guides and assistants. This plan was suggested as a result of meetings between Caldwell, Idaho business men and business men of Ontario and Nyssa.

Other marketing work of a preliminary nature was done, principally of an investigational nature in connection with the Oregon Wool and Mohair Growers Association and the Oregon Growers Cooperative Association.

Other Project Work
A farm record survey of wheat yields to obtain first hand information direct from the farms about the Spring wheat yields with relation to varieties, time of seeding, rate of seeding, and number of irrigations, was undertaken. Sufficient data had been secured at the end of the month, to make it apparent that some very valuable information would be available as a result when the survey is completed. This work will be reported later in more detail.

Some time was spent in locating seed potatoes, for next year's crop, particular emphasis being placed on the purchase of some extra good certified seed for planting seed plots.

Some time was also devoted to fair work in connection with Oregon Slope community fair, the Malheur County Fair, the N. W. Grain and Hay Show, and in helping the Club Leader instruct corn club members in the selection of exhibits. The farm bureau news was edited and the usual reports prepared. Assistant county agent leader, F. L. Ballard, was in conference with the agent during the month, as was also Director Jardine of the Oregon Experiment Station and Director Paul V. Maris, of the Extension Service.

Miscellaneous
During the period covered by this report, approximately 70 persons called at the office on business; the agent made 9 visits at farms and 14 visits at demonstrations; 6 project meetings with a total attendance of 188 were held and 2 other meetings were attended; 3 articles were prepared for the local press and 15 for the Farm Bureau News; 114 personal business letters and 14 circular letters of 879 copies were written; 11 days were spent in the field, 19 in the office and 3 on vacation.
