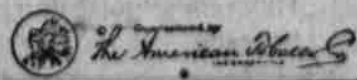

### FARM REMINDERS

Twenty minutes to half an hour of drying is usually sufficient to make Bordeaux stick to the trees for months even through the rainiest weather finds the O. A. C. Experiment station. Don't let the prospect of rain delay spraying. Only actual rain should stop it.—Botany and Plant Pathology.

Fall plowing of upland vegetable gardens make it possible for the land to be worked earlier the following spring. Many western Oregon soils in the home gardens are such as to be benefitted by lying rough during the winter exposed to frost. A coating of straw manure turned under the top surface of soil will help to prevent excessive leaching. O. A. C.

Bright fall weather gives the fruit growers opportunity to "Worm" their peach and prune trees. The root borer is one of the most serious pests of the peach and prune in Oregon. "Worming", or removing the borers by hand is as yet the most reliable method known for their control. Use a sharp knife and avoid injury to the tree. It is well to apply Bordeaux mixture to the wounds before replacing the soil. The O. A. C. Experiment station has developed washes for summer use, formulas of which will be sent free to anyone interested.—Entomology.

New and improved instructions for making Bordeaux by adding sugar to prevent decomposition of the spray are now available for distribution by the O. A. C. Experiment Station. Probably the chief reason for unsatisfactory results in hill selection of seed potatoes is that the selection is started at digging time instead of at blossom time. Leaf mosaic, curly dwarf, and spindle sprout, are easily detected when vines are green but not after they have withered. Evidence of these diseases is not found on the tubers. If plenty of healthy, vigorous plants are staked at blossom time a good supply of disease free seed can be selected at digging time.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

### CRANBERRY RECIPES

**Try This on Your Meat Grinder**  
**CRANBERRY RELISH**—Take the desired quantity of cranberries for use. Put them through the ordinary meat grinder. To each cup full of ground berries, add equal amount of sugar. Stir and mix thoroughly so that the sugar will melt and form a syrup. If it is to be used immediately, it is desirable to place on a radiator or the back of a stove, giving just sufficient heat to hasten the melting of the sugar, but under no circumstances should heat enough be applied to cook the berries in the slightest degree. Keep in a glass jar or an earthen dish. This will be found a delicious relish for general use at all times.

**CRANBERRY SAUCE**—One quart of cranberries, two cups boiling water. 1 1/2 to 2 cups of sugar. Boil the sugar and water together for five minutes; skim; add the berries and cook, without stirring (five minutes is usually sufficient) until all the skins are broken.

**CRANBERRY PIE**—Have ready a partly baked pastry shell and pour in sauce when cold, made by the above recipe. Put strips of pastry over the top, and finish baking in a moderate oven.

**CRANBERRY JELLY**—Cook until soft the desired quantity of cranberries with 1 1/2 pints of water for each two quarts of berries. Strain the juice through a jelly bag.

Measure the juice and heat it to the boiling point. Add one cup of sugar for every two cups of juice; stir until the sugar is dissolved; boil briskly for five minutes; skim, and pour into glasses, porcelain or crockery molds. Eight pounds of cranberries and 2 1-3 lbs. of sugar make ten tumblers of beautiful jelly. Always cook cranberries in porcelain-lined, enameled or aluminum utensils.

### CANNED CRANBERRIES TO BE PLACED ON RATION OF NAVY

Through the efforts of Senator R. N. Stanfield, the navy has made a ruling to the effect that canned cranberries may be placed on the ration list of the Navy. Previous to this time, cranberries had been listed only in fresh form, and in consequence no canned cranberries could be offered for sale for use in the Navy. The action of Senator Stanfield provides a new outlet for this already famous Oregon product. This announcement comes as a welcome order to the personnel of the Pacific Fleet, for at holiday time many of the officers and men may be away in distant stations or in Asiatic waters far from that patriotic combination turkey and cranberry sauce.

Late Pacific Coast cranberries are now appearing on the markets. The local berries are readily distinguishable from their Atlantic cousin, the eastern cranberry, by the lighter color of the local fruit. This lighter color is now recognized as a distinct asset, as it gives the cooked product a much brighter red hue, and also creates a stiffer jelly. No cranberry could produce a sauce or jelly of finer quality than those grown in our own state.

The entire crop is now harvested, and the growers are now devoting their attention to the quality of their pack. Fine weather during September and the first part of October has permitted the fruit to be picked dry, and the growers are well pleased with the fact that they had such favorable weather during their harvest, as the keeping quality of their product is decidedly improved thereby. The crop is fully up to earlier expectations, and with an acute shortage of the eastern cranberry, the Oregon cranberry is already in great demand.

In the great cranberry district at the mouth of the Columbia River is the bulk of Pacific Coast cranberries grown. Oregon and Washington have joined forces in a marketing campaign, and growers of these states have formed the Pacific Cranberry Exchange which markets their fruit.

## RED CROSS GIVES ANNUAL BUDGET

\$19,361,657 Allotted for Current Program of Relief and Service.

### MILLIONS FOR VETERAN AID

Medical Aid for European Children Will Cost \$5,000,000 This Year.

Washington.—Expenditures totalling \$19,361,657 for carrying through its program of relief and services in the United States and overseas are outlined in the budget of the American Red Cross for the current fiscal year. This total is more than \$5,000,000 lower than the expenditure during the last fiscal year, when the disbursements reached \$24,402,741, it is announced at National Headquarters in a statement calling attention to the necessity of continued support of the organization by response to the Annual Roll Call, November 11 to 24, if the vital work of the society is to be effectively carried on.

Outstanding among the items of the domestic budget is the appropriation of \$3,000,250 for work in behalf of the disabled ex-service man and his family. This appropriation represents the amount allotted to this work from National Headquarters only and does not take into consideration the millions being spent in chapters for relief of the World War veteran. It is in the chapter that the greater amount is spent in meeting this obligation of the Red Cross, the announcement continues, as manifested by figures of the fiscal year 1920-1921 when the total was approximately \$0,000,000, of which \$2,002,004 represented the disbursement of National Headquarters while the remainder was the chapters' contribution to this field of Red Cross service.

### Vaunt Work for Disabled

Chief among the sub-divisions of the appropriation for work with veterans is that which concerns itself with assistance to disabled men and women in government hospitals. This item of \$1,700,000, an increase of more than \$500,000 over the appropriation for the same work in last year's budget, will provide those personal services for the disabled and their families which are indispensable to supplement those provided by the government. The director of the Veterans' Bureau has recently expressed his desire that the Red Cross should continue and extend these "humanizing services." Other items of the appropriation for veterans' relief are proportionately increased. An additional appropriation of \$400,000 has been made for Red Cross work in connection with regular Army and Navy hospitals and with the regular Army and Navy.

For disaster relief, the Red Cross has set aside for the current twelve months an appropriation of \$543,976, virtually doubling the appropriation for the same purpose for the fiscal year 1920-1921.

More than \$2,000,000 is provided for service and assistance to the 5,000 Red Cross chapters by the national organization.

### Helping Destitute Children

Other items of the domestic budget include \$408,546 for miscellaneous activities, including contributions restricted for special purposes and \$768,000 for management. Each of these items represents large reductions over similar appropriations of the previous year.

From a fund of \$10,000,000, \$5,000,000 of which was contributed through the European Relief Council campaign and \$5,000,000 allotted by the Red Cross for child welfare work in Europe, there remains \$8,705,108 still available, of which it is estimated that \$6,000,000 will be required for this work during the current year. For Red Cross participation in the joint effort to relieve famine conditions in Russia, for final work in the China famine, for Junior Red Cross and other overseas activities including the closing of the old general relief program in Europe \$4,978,000 is made available.

In announcing the national budget, the Red Cross makes it clear that the figures do not include chapter expenditures or place any cash estimate on the invaluable service of volunteers in chapters.
