The boys will leave Ontario, Saturday afternoon, November 5 and will return the following Thursday.

The Board of Directors of the Pacific International Livestock Show, recognizing the importance of interesting the boys and girls in the art of judging livestock have offered \$750.00 toward paying the expenses of the teams. \$250.00 of this amount will go toward furnishing room and board for the club members while at the show and the remaining \$500.00 will be prorated among the teams, the amount each team will receive will depend upon the distance they have to travel.

It is expected that at least 20 teams from various counties in Oregon, Washington and Idaho will be present. The competition for first place will be very keen but the boys are going to do their best to win this coveted honor.

The Cairo stockjudging team won this right to represent Malheur County at the stock show by winning second place at the County Fair. The Oregon Slope team which won first place will spend two weeks at the Boys and Girls Summer School, at Corvallis next June.

R. W. Swagler, Sam Taylor and H. W. Chapman were among those who attended the football game at Caldwell, Wednesday.

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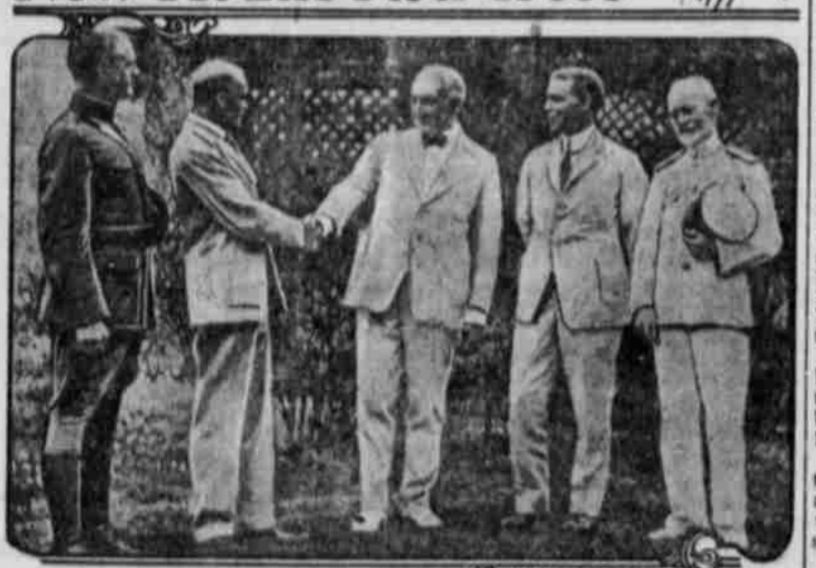
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President Harding Now Heads Red Cross
