

Same Conditions Which Ranchers Faced Year Ago Still In Evidence Now It Time To Act

Had every farmer on the irrigated had every farmer on the trigated lands listened to and followed some part at least of the suggestions made last year by the farm bureau committees, it is safe to say that things would be in better shape now, both on and off of the farm for there can be no question now that they would be in better shape that they were right when a sur-plus of hay and low prices were predicted and that at least fifty perwere cent of the hay should be replaced with other crops which could be gotten out of the county to market. These recommendations, as given publicity last fall were in part as follows: "1. That the Farm Bureau should

recommend a reduction in the area of alfalfa hay of at least 50 per cent on the land suffed to other crops near transportation in order to maintain the hay and general farm business on a profitable basis. 2. That wheat, corn and clover

seed should be recommended as standard cash crops for general use, with potatoes and other crops re-quiring less acreage used as desired. 3. That the irrigated pasture and increased use of silos would be val-uable in encouraging livestock keeping and more profitable feeding, thus increasing home consumption

of hay. 4. That the best standard three year crop rotation should be clover, corn, wheat, substituting other row crops in place of part of the corn if

5. That the standard two year ro-tation should be clover, wheat. 6. Fo riands unsuited to grain and corn production, sweet clover, pasture and seed production, with silage and alfalfa hay is recommend-ed to each a with building and how ed to enable soil building and home consumption of products."

CIDER MAY BE KEPT SWEET Sweet cider may be preserved by heating it to 160 degrees F and then scaling it in clean bottles or jugs. After the bottles are sealed place them in water and heat to the same temperature for one half hour, when sterilization will be complete. Experiments made by the horticul-tural products department show that cider may be kept sweet indefinitely this way.-O. A. C. Exp. Station.
