### FARM BUREAU WILL STAGE PRUNING SCHOOLS

Horticulture Committee and County Agent Arranging For Demonstrations November 14 to 18

Arrangements have been made with E. L. Long, Extension Specialist in Horticulture to give a series of pruning schools and pruning demonstrations for the benefit of the orchardists in Malheur County on November 14 to 18. The work will begin on Monday, at Ontario the forenoon being devoted to blackboard illustrations and lectures on the principles governing the pruning of trees to secure maximum fruit production. In the afternoon a pruning demonstration will be staged in the T. W. Claggett orchard just west of Ontario. The following day a similar course of instruction will be given at Nyssa. On Wednesday Mr. Long will assist the Oregon Slope orchardists in their pruning problems and on Thursday he will be at Brogan. On Friday, there will be some work done on pruning prunes at some central point where all of the prune growers can attend.

This work is considered of very great importance by the members of the farm bureau horticulture committee and prominent orchardists of the various districts. Those who heard Mr. Long lecture last winter, are particularly anxious to get in touch with him again. Everyone who attends is expected to bring pruning tools and do some actual pruning under Mr. Long's instructions. It has been suggested that all professional pruners should be given a special and insistent invitation to attend these meetings by all growers who expect to avail themselves of such services.

### MAN FROM HUNGARY ASKS FOR OREGON PRUNE DRIER

From Hungary has come a request to the college for blue prints of the Oregon Tunnel prune drier, designed by E. H. Wiegand, horticulturalist of the horticultural products section of the Oregon experiment station. P. Winterstein and son of Budapest, Hungary, are the men interested in the new drier, which is said to possess distinct advantages over the ordinary types now in use. The blue prints have been sent as requested.

This new drier is attracting attention in California as well. Two of the large prune growers of that state, Carl K. Schnavel and Ned Raney of Yuba City, and Live Oaks, respectively, were in Corvallis this week gathering information and data regarding it with a view to installing similar plants in their orchards.
