AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO NOTICE OF QUARANTINE NO. 7 PERTAINING TO ALFALFA WEEVIL IN MALHEUR COUNTY, OREGON

The fact has been determined by the President of the Oregon State Board of Horticulture that an injurious insect pest, the Alfalfa weevil (*Phytonomus Posticus*), new to and not heretofore widely prevalent or distributed within and throughout the State of Oregon, exists in Malheur County, Oregon.

Now, therefore, it is declared necessary, in order to further prevent the introduction of alfalfa weevil (*Phytonomus Posticus*) into other portions of the State of Oregon, that all of the Provisions and requirements set forth in notice of Quarantine No. 7 be hereby made to apply until further notice, to all parts of that territory known as the County of Malheur, State of Oregon.

Notice of Quarantine No. 7 is amended accordingly.
