DAIRY RECORD KEEPING POPULAR WITH CLUB MEMBERS

Four Dairy Herd Record Keeping Clubs have been organized within the last two weeks in this county. "If I'm going to have to help dad milk the cows he is buying I want to know if they are making money," is the way one youthful dairyman ex-pressed it when enrolling with one of these clubs.

Each member selects at least two ows, either his own or his neighbors, and keeps accurate records on them for a period of six months. The record of each cow includes the butter-fat, labor and feed records, because it is necessary to have all three in order to know exactly what the cow is doing. The butter-fat re-cord is found by weighing and testing the milk every two weeks. The feed record is an estimate of the hay and pasture, but accurate weights of all grain, root crops, etc., are made once a month.

During the project year, several trips are made to score dairy barns and equipment, and a limited time is spent in judging dairy cows.

The clubs which have been organized at the present are at Oregon Slope, White Settlement, Big Bend and Kingman Kolony.
