HENS ARE NOT SENSITIVE ABOUT HOUSING CONDITION

Hens Shut up in Chicken House for Entire Year lay Over 228 Eggs —Idaho Flock Money Earner.

In the year 1914-15 the Oregon Agricultural College tried an experiment to see what the effect of close confinement would be on egg production of the hens. They took a flock of 25 pullets and put them in an open front house 8x12 feet in dimensions. They also put another flock of chickens in another house the same size. Both flocks of 25 pullets were fed exactly alike, but one flock was closely confined and was not allowed out of the building the entire year. The other 25 hens were permitted to run out in the open as much as they desired. One of the pullets died in the enclosed house after laying 150 eggs. The remaining 24 hens averaged 228 eggs per hen, all but 4 of the pullets laying over 200 eggs. They exceeded the production of the flock which was allowed to run out by an average of 10 eggs to the hen, and 6 hens out of the 25 died during the year. The showing of the hens confined was a considerable increase over the pen that was allowed to run at large and indicate that hens are not particularly sensitive of condition of housing providing other factors are favorable, including an abundance of fresh air and exercise and that a hen of good laying capacity will lay well under conditions of being housed up during the entire year.

Mrs. Paul Crumroy, a Minidoka county farm woman, reports a gross income of \$83.75 per week as the output spring layers, with eggs at 50 cents per dozen. Accounts kept show she has been getting between four and five cases of eggs per week from that number of chickens. Only white Leghorns are handled, and a recent demonstration made by Miss Nina Huyck, home demonstration agent for the county, in her poultry work, showed scarcely a cull present in the whole flock, which, she says is unique in her experience.

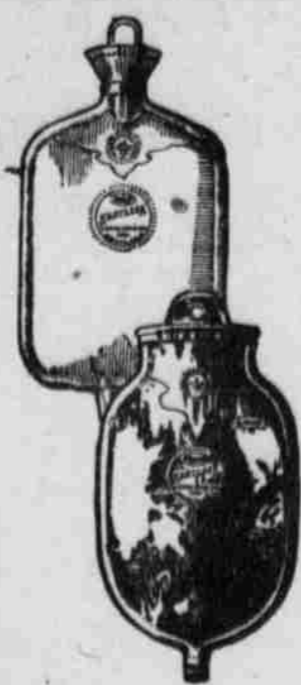
