Several facts and comparisons of interest can be made from the accompanying table. Perhaps the most striking fact is brought out in the first column of figures. Note that in this average of the entire seventy-eight farms after deducting the cash operating expenses from the total receipts but \$80 dollars was left as ngt farm income. Aside from the farm products consumed by the family and a house to live in this \$80 represents the yearly return for the farmer's and his family's labor and interest on his \$16,832 invested. Or to put it in another way, after allowinterest on his \$15,832 invested. Or to put it in another way, after allowing 5 per cent interest on their hyverage investment, which is a comparatively low rate for this section, these farmers averaged a minus labor income of \$932. Such are the facts for these farms in 1920, when "the bottom dropped out" of alfalfa.

In comparing the hay farms with

aged \$1675, and instead of a minus family labor income of \$933, it was \$739 to their credit.

To analyze further the results for 1920. Out of the 78 farms was segregated those who depended entirely on the sale of alfalfa as their one source of income. There were 15 such farms in this group and the results are given in column 2. Not that these 15 farms lacked \$607 of making operating expenses with no return for family labor and no interest on investment. In column 3 is grouped those farms (only 5) that had the major portion of their income from the sale of dairy products. These 5 dairy farms averaged \$672 net income. The difference between this dairy group and the hay group was \$1279, or over \$100 per month, which is a very fair return for the work in feeding and milking a few head of dairy cows. To put this comparison on a labor-income basis we find over \$2000 in favor of a dairy group and the dairy group for 1919, as brought out in columns 6 and 7, does not show the same relation. In fact the dairy farms, which averaged

The results for the year of 1919 when alfalfa hay sold for \$15 to \$16 per ton in the stack are very different. These results are shown in Column 5. Here isstead of \$80 as not farm income the farmers averaged \$1675, and instead of a minus family labor income of \$933, it was \$739 to their credit.
