To J. W. Galloway and John Bohrer, of the above named defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, you and each of you are hereby commanded to be and appear in the above entitled Court and cause within six weeks after the first publication of this summons, which date of first publication is December 29, 1921, then and there to answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed herein. And if you fail so to do, for want thereof plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in said complaint, to-wit:

For the foreclosure of assessment liens of Crystal District Improvement Company against lands described as the S $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Sec 13, and the E $\frac{1}{2}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. 24, in Township 16 S., Range 47 E., W. M., in the following sums and amounts:

(1) On the first cause of suit in the sum of \$225.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1914 until paid, and the further sums of \$22.50 as penalty and \$22.50 as attorney's fees.

(2) On the second cause of suit in the sum of \$250.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1915 until paid and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty and \$25.00 as attorney's fees.

(3) On the third cause of suit in the sum of \$250.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1916 until paid, and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty and \$25.00 as attorney's fees.

(4) On the fourth cause of suit in the sum of \$275.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1917 until paid and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty, and \$27.50 as attorney's fees.

And for the foreclosure of assessment liens by the said Crystal District Improvement Company against the lands described as the S $\frac{1}{4}$ SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 13, NE $\frac{1}{4}$ NE $\frac{1}{4}$, SE $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 24, and also a tract of land described as follows: Commencing at the northwest corner of the

Detailed Analysis of Sixty-Two Malheur County Farm Incomes Boosts Dairying

Survey Made During Past Two Years By Farm Bureau in Co-Operation With O. A. C. Reveals Many Interesting Facts Concerning Basic Industry of Malheur County.

The dairy business is not "all shot to pieces" as some discouraged ones are prone to believe. In fact, the dairy farmer is as well or better off than men following other types of farming. At least the facts brought out in the accompanying table strengthens this more optimistic view.

The Farm Management Division of the College Extension Service and the County Agricultural Agent of Malheur county, cooperating have for the past two years been conducting farm accounting projects and financial farm surveys with a number of farmers in the Snake River Irrigation district. Sixty-two farmers submitted reports for the year 1919 and seventy-eight reports were secured for the year 1920. It is hoped as many records will be obtained for the year 1921. Some of these results form the basis for the data and observations following.

but \$230 higher, in net farm income, than the hay farms, had only \$11 more family labor income. As has been stated before was year of high prices for hay when compared to the prices of dairy products. Of course it is true that prices for dairy products were high in 1919, but not as high comparatively as hay prices.

In order not to draw conclusions from only a few farms in one section, the results on 40 dairy farms in Washington county for 1920 are tabulated in column 4. Here it is noticed that net farm income was \$1522, while it was only \$672 for the dairy group in Malheur county for 1920. A higher investment from the Washington county group, upon which to charge interest leaves the labor incomes, however, quite close in comparison.

In comparing the hay farms with the dairy farms for 1920 (col. 2 & 3) attention can be called to the total receipts. The dairy group with about one-third the acreage and one-third the investment were able to take in approximately 80 per cent as much income as the hay group. In fact, only \$508 less. Their total expenses were \$1787 less. The one item contributing most to this big difference in expense is hired labor, \$1272 on hay farms and \$203 on the dairy farms, over \$1000 difference. No doubt this is due to the excess labor demanded at haying time to cure for three times as much hay. The dairy farms being more diversified are cared for entirely by family labor distributed over the entire year. Again the larger size of the hay farm calls for \$450 more water tax, an item which is large enough at best, averaging 25 per cent of the expense on all groups of farms.

The striking fact brought out in this study surely supports the oft-preached story "Advantages of Diversified Farming over the One Crop System." It is not necessary to fall back on the fertility reason for doing so, but immediate and direct returns in dollars and cents show the problem to be purely a farm management one. And in a section as this one is, where conditions are ideal for alfalfa hay and corn silage, the family size dairy farm should become a permanent business.
