"THE HOME STRETCH" IS REAL COMEDY DRAMA

Comedies possessing genuine elements of gripping tingling drama and of delicate sentiment without sacrificing laugh power are infrequent enough to cause Douglas MacLean's latest Paramount picture, "The Home Stretch," which comes to the Majestic Theatre next Saturday to stand forth as one of the most original and entertaining offerings of the year.
