CELEBRATE SIXTIETH WEDDING ANNIVERSARY

Seldom is it given to a couple to celebrate their sixtieth wedding anniversary but that honor was given a most worthy couple in Fruitland Sunday marked the event for Mr. and Mrs. Charles Himler. The three adult classes of the Brethren Sunday School entertained in their honor in the basement of the church at a most sumptuous dinner after the morning service. There were 100 present and gifts were presented the aged couple which were greatly appreciated.

Charles Himler was born October 4, 1835, in Germany and came to this country in 1837. Catharine Garver was born October 28, 1843, in Ohio and at sixteen years of age went to Iowa. She was married to Mr. Himler January 8, 1862 at Washington, Iowa. To them seven children were born, four sons and

three daughters. They have 21 grandchildren and 23 great-grandchildren. Mr. and Mrs. Himler received the heartiest of congratulations because they were able to celebrate this happy event. They are most worthy and highly respected by the Fruitland people where they have lived for about twenty years.

The funeral services for Mr. Henry Heckes, who passed away early Sat-

urday morning were held Monday on Pennsylvania Avenue. Rev. Geo. Todd of the M. E. church conducted the services while the quartette from the M. E. church rendered beautiful music. The body was taken to Riverside cemetery Payette where a short service was held. Mr. Heckes was born in Germany sixty one years ago, coming here when he was eleven years old. Seven children were born to them, one dying in infancy, the remainder, John, Harry, Avil, Nellie, George and Carl, were all present with the wife at the bedside when he passed away. Mr. Heckes has known for some time that he could not get well and his patience and fortitude through all the intense suffering were very remarkable.

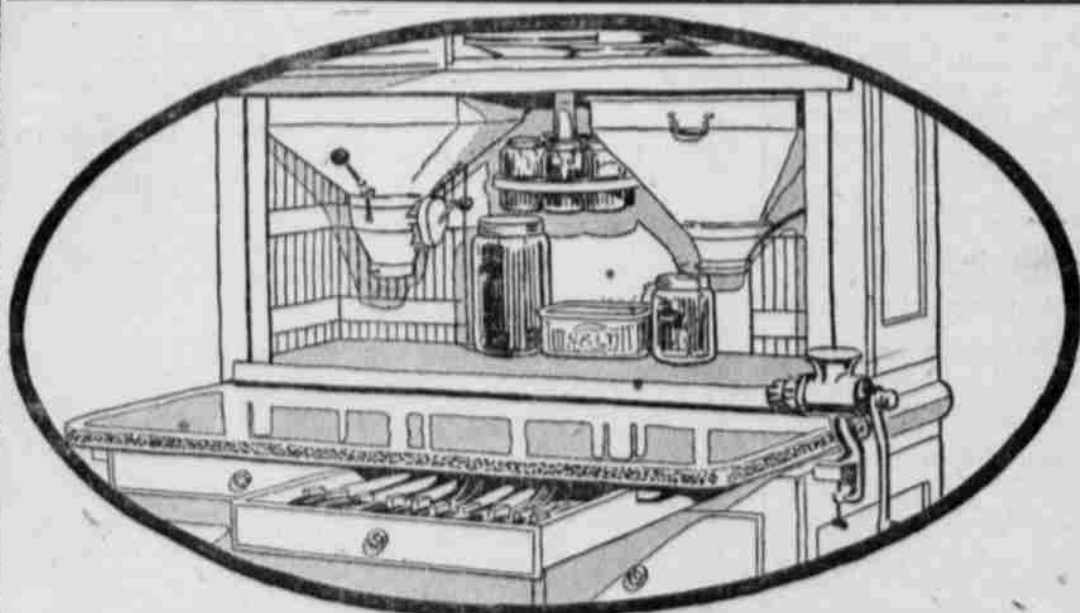

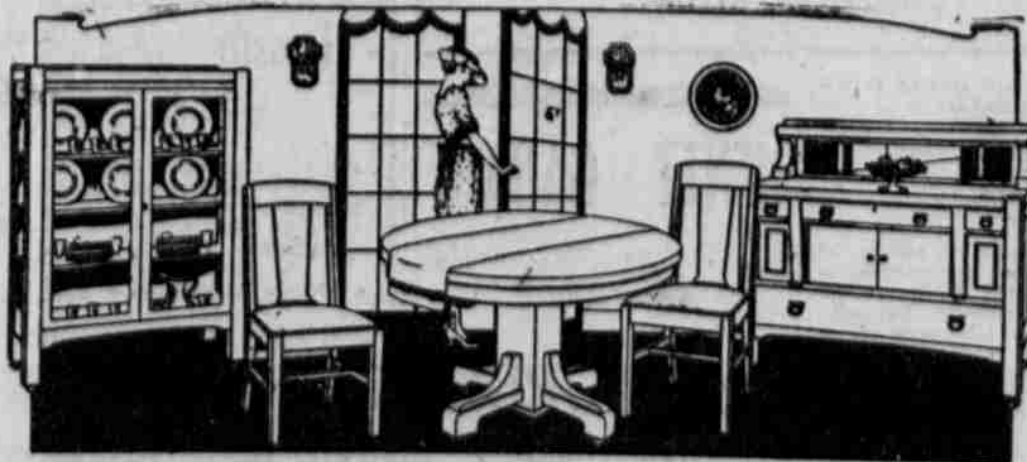
