SUMMONS

To J. W. Galloway and John Bohrer, of the above named defendants:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON, you and each of you are hereby commanded to be and appear in the above entitled Court and cause within six weeks after the first publication of this summons, which date of first publication is December 29, 1921, then and there to answer or otherwise plead to the complaint filed herein. And if you fail so to do, for want thereof plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief demanded in said complaint, to-wit:

For the foreclosure of assessment liens of Crystal District Improvement Company against lands described as the S 1/4 SE 1/4 of Sec 13, and the E 1/4 NE 1/4, Sec. 24, in Township 16 S., Range 47 E., W. M., in the following sums and amounts:

(1) On the first cause of suit in the sum of \$225.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1914 until paid, and the further sums of \$22.50 as penalty and \$22.50 as attorney's fees.

(2) On the second cause of suit in the sum of \$250.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1915 until paid and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty and \$25.00 as attorney's fees.

(3) On the third cause of suit in the sum of \$250.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1916 until paid, and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty and \$25.00 as attorney's fees.

(4) On the fourth cause of suit in the sum of \$275.00 with interest at 10 per cent per annum from October 1, 1917 until paid and the further sums of \$25.00 as penalty, and \$27.50 as attorney's fees.

FLAX INDUSTRY

The Argus during the Coming Weeks will Present a Series of Interesting and Informative Articles on Industries Which were prepared as Compositions in the Commercial Department of the Ontario High School.

Probably the most important fiber plant is flax. Its original home is not known, but it is best adapted to the region around the Mediterranean Sea. Flax was used by the prehistoric Lake Dwellers, and the mummies found in the pyramids and tombs of Egypt were wrapped in strips of linen.

Flax is an annual growing from two to three feet high. The variety used for the fiber has long slender stems which do not become branching until near the top. The plant usually has blue flowers but in places the flowers are white. When these blossoms drop off they leave small, long-shaped dark brown seeds. Flax is raised for seed and for the fiber also. Characteristics which distinguish the flax fiber fineness, solidity and suppleness. Though the flax fiber is longer than other fibers used in spinning, its length is unnecessary to spinning because of the nature of the surface of the fiber, which is cylindrical in shape and has small cracks running around it. These cracks tend to keep the fiber from slipping apart.

Flax will grow in almost any part of the United States as soil has more to do with its growth than climate. It needs a strong, rich soil. A heavy, well drained soil is preferred to a light sandy loam. The field must be well cultivated and kept entirely free from weeds. Flax soon draws all the strength from the soil so a large amount of fertilizer must be used.

The seeds are sown in the spring. If a fine fiber is wanted the seeds are sown very thickly and when in full blossom the plants are pulled up and taken thru the different processes of dressing. If a coarse fiber is wanted the seeds are not so thickly sown and the plants are allowed to become partly matured before pulling.

Where the fiber is to be used most of the field work is done by hand; but where seed alone is wanted ordinary mowers and harvesters are used for cutting and threshing.

Flax is most successfully cultivated in Belgium. This is mostly due to the fact that there is an abundance of labor there. A very fine grade of fiber is grown in Belgium, which is used in the making of fine linen and laces; notably Brussels lace. It has been proved that the value of the flax fiber crop in Belgium, for some years, exceeds the value of the land on which it is grown.

Besides Belgium, other countries producing flax for fiber are: Russia, Austria-Hungary, Ireland, and a small amount in the United States. Most of the flax grown in the United States is grown for seed.

In India flax is grown entirely for seed. It is of a different variety than that grown for fiber. The plant is not so high and is very branching, thus producing more seeds. Indian flax is grown in large fields, and when the seeds are ripe it is harvested in much the same manner as wheat or other grains.

The preparation of the flax fiber is called dressing. This consists of a number of processes: rippling, retting, scutching and spinning. Rippling is the stripping off of the seeds from the stalk. This is done by the use of combs about day of January 1922.
