Flax will grow in almost any part
of the United States as soil has more to do with its growth than climate. It needs a strong, rich soil. A heavy, well drained soil is preferred to a light sandy loam. The field must be well cultivated and kept entirely free from weeds. Flax soon draws all the strength from the soil so a large amount of fertilizer must be used.

Where the fiber is to be used Where the fiber is to be used most of the field work is done by hand; but where seed alone is wanted ordinary mowers and harvesters are used for cutting and threshing. Fiax is most successfully culti-vated in Belgium. This is mostly due to the fact that there is an
