The 1921 income tax law requires that a single person claiming exemption as the head of a family must file a return if his net income is \$1000 or more, notwithstanding the fact that as head of a family, he is entitled to an exemption of \$2500, as well as \$400 for each dependent under 18 years of age. Income tax returns must be filed not later than March 15, 1922.

TWO MEN BABY NURSES HELP EARN WAY AT "U"

No Job Scorned By Oregon Students Who Seek Higher Learning—Valuable Training For Life Secured
University of Oregon, Eugene, Feb. 21, Special—The men students of the University of Oregon are earning their way by doing a multitude of tasks, many of them unusual according to a statement on working students just issued by the campus Y. M. C. A. which is the clearing house for student employment. Two men students have jobs taking care of babies while the parents are out. This ranks as a desirable position, for simultaneous opportunity is afforded for study if the baby is not too chronically given to vocal protest. Besides, if education is a training for life, there is unquestionably an educational value to the experience. Then there is the immediate reward at so much per hour. Other jobs performed by working men students in order to secure money with which to continue their studies, include cooking, tending fires, washing dishes and serving as waiters in restaurants, janitors, stenographers, bookkeepers and tutors. One man runs a popcorn stand down town. Another is a hotel clerk. Several are employed as clerks in the Eugene stores. It is estimated that students earn an aggregate of \$20,000 a year doing odd jobs of this sort while pursuing their studies.

In addition to the odd jobs, regular part time work during the school year and summer employment enable two-thirds of the students of this University, both men and women, to be wholly or partly self-supporting.

In September ory and local cream stations is no the Litchfield creamery price was 48 cents a pound, says T. S. Stitta, Meeker county agent in his report to University Farm, as compared to an average local station price of 36 cents. A patron who delivered 275 pounds of butter fat to the creamery during September received \$32.99 more than if the same cream had been delivered to a cream station. In like manner each patron of the local cream station might have had 25 cents extra on every 75 cents received for cream delivered at the local cream stations.—Extension News.

In making out his income tax return, the farmer is required to report as gross income all receipts derived from the sale or exchange of farm products, including crops and livestock, whether produced on the farm or purchased on the farm or purchased and resold. Where farm produce is exchanged for groceries, merchandise or other articles, the fair market value of the article received must be reported as income. A farmer who rents his farm on the crop-share basis must report such income for the year in which the crops are sold. Profits derived from the sale or rental of lands must be reported.

The time for filing partnership and fiduciary returns of income for the year 1921 has been extended from March 15 to May 15, according to Clyde G. Huntley, Collector of Internal Revenue. However, the extension in time which has been granted for filing partnership return in no way affects the filing of individual income tax returns by the members of a partnership. Each member of every partnership is required to file a return of his individual income not later than March 15, regardless of the fact that the return for the partnership need not be filed until May 15.
