CHAS. RAY TAGUE FORMERLY
OF JAMIESON BURIED MONDAY

Charles Ray Tague, formerly of Jamieson, but of recent years a resident of Caldwell, was buried here Monday. Service was held from the Methodist Church in charge of Rev. Henry Young and interment was made in the Ontario cemetery, many friends came from the upper country to pay their respects to the deceased.

Mr. Tague who was one of three sons of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Tague, pioneers of the Willow River country is survived by his two brothers and seven sisters. He was born in Gibbon, Nebraska, 37 years ago and came with his parents to Jamieson when but six years of age. He grew to manhood in this country and years ago was married. His wife died several years ago. His only son is now a resident of Ironside where he lives with relatives. He is 16 years old.

Eight years ago Mr. Tague moved to Caldwell where he had since resided. His death came as a distinct shock to his relatives and friends in this section, for he was ill but a few days. He first was stricken on Saturday February 18, with pneumonia, which was followed by a stroke of paralysis, from these two causes he died on Thursday February 23.

The body was brought to Ontario Sunday for interment. The brothers and sisters who survive him, many of whom are well known in this section are: Mrs. Vena Boswell of Ontario, Mrs. J. A. Derrick and Mrs. Ed. Kendall of Jamieson; Mrs. Bertha Lockert and Harry Tague

of Brogan; Mrs. B. F. Parks of Nebraska; Mrs. P. J. Flaharty of Pender, Nebraska; Mrs. A. W. McAulay of North Yakima, Washington, and Emory Tague whose address is unknown.

In making out his income tax return, the farmer is required to report as gross income all receipts derived from the sale or exchange of farm products, including crops and livestock, whether produced on the farm or purchased on the farm or purchased and resold. Where farm produce is exchanged for groceries, merchandise or other articles, the fair market value of the article received must be reported as income. A farmer who rents his farm on the crop-share basis must report such income for the year in which the crops are sold. Profits derived from the sale or rental of lands must be reported.
