DEATH CLAIMS BEULAH MAN

Alfred Morton Dies After Short Illness—Leaves Wife and Two Small Children—Body Is Brought Here For Interment

John Alfred Morton, aged 34, died at Beulah Tuesday, February 28 after an illness of two weeks. Pneumonia was the direct cause of death. The young man is survived by his wife who was Rose Lamberson prior to their marriage eight years ago, and two small daughters aged 5 and 2 respectively.

He is also survived by his father Ed. E. Morton of Boise, two brothers Bryan and James Morton and three sisters, Mrs. Maggie Gould and Mrs. Kattie Warren of New Plymouth, and Mrs. Mamie Best of Boise.

Mr. Morton was born of a pioneer family of the Payette Valley between New Plymouth and Falk's store, but came to Malheur county when 15 years of age and lived here since. The body was brought to Ontario today from Beulah and funeral service will be held Friday from the Peterson chapel, Rev. Chas. Blom officiating. Interment will be made in the Ontario cemetery.

Essays must be sent to Mrs. Will J. Roberts, Supt. Essay Contest, Ontario, Oregon, to reach her not later than April 20th.

Teachers should see no names are signed to essays but each essay should give grade and be numbered as teacher chooses, corresponding numbers with names sent in separate envelope marked. Name of contestants from school (give name or number of school.)

Name of school should be written on wrapper inclosing essays. Reference material may be obtained from the county librarian; Life Extension Institute, New York City; W. C. T. U. Publishing House, Evanston, Ill.

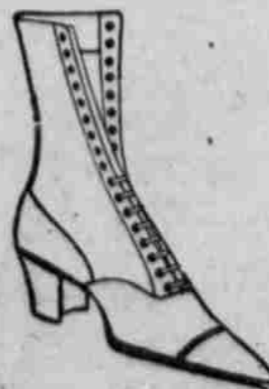
