Public Discussion of the Subject In the Japanese Press is Regarded as Significant.

A series of articles on love and marriage is appearing in Japanese newspapers and magazines, as a sign of the modern tendencies of the Japanese mentality. Professors in psychology, school teachers and writers of note are prominent in the discussion on reforming the old matrimonial system, all advocating more freedom for personal

According to the old custom, the parents chose bride and bridegroom and the marriage was performed without the interested parties having known each other. Marriage was considered a duty towards country and family, the religion of ancestor worship being its principle. The young couples lived with the parents and the bride owed complete obedience to her mother-in-law.

The custom is now prevalent for the young people to meet long before the marriage takes place so that they may know each other, and to live apart from the family is no longer con-sidered undutiful. Yet, of late, the cendency appeared to marry for love's sake and out of personal choice.
