creek, where one of the women of the party died and was buried. From there they went over the divide to Camp Creek, which they followed for miles before they turned westward to the Deschutes, thence to The Dalles."

Years afterwards, having been told the above by his uncle, Mr. Anderson had the following unique experience which tended strongly to establish the authenticity of his uncle's narrative. He tells of these incidents as follows:

"In 1882 when I was riding the range and working with Charles Requa's outfit, we had a cook named James Dorris, who was a member of the party which found the Blue Bucket mine. He was 14 years old when he crossed the plains, and from him I was again told the story of its finding and many of the experiences of the party.

"One day when we were riding on Beaver creek near Moore's ranch,

I went with Dorris riding to the mouth of Camp creek. As we reached the mouth of the creek he said to me: 'I was on that trail coming down from the bench that we struck Crooked river and back on that trail three or four miles my father lost a stay chain. It was an old fashioned chain broken in two. It has five or six links and a hook. It was six or seven days back on the trail from the point where father lost the chain that the gold was found.'

"Next spring, that is the spring of 1883, Bill Circle of Prineville, found the chain just as Dorris had described it, and at just about the point he told me that it was lost.

Lyman's Confirmation

"In 1865 Mr. Lyman who led the party up Emigrant creek, returned over that route. On his first trip after a bunch of his cattle had died, he left a buggy at a camp ground on the trail and returned to locate it. He declared that it was after he had left the party which found the gold, that it was located, so that confirms the statement that the Blue Bucket is west of Silvie's river.

Found a Second Time

"In 1883, when with a party I was working with on the south side of Crooked river we met to men who had been in search of the Blue Bucket mine and who had picked up many relics on the trail which served to guide them backward. They had information gathered from various sources and they too declared that the mine was somewhere on Wagon Tire mountain.

"In 1878 a man by the name of A. B. Marks bought a bunch of cattle near Wagon Tire, and had them in corrals there. With him was a fellow named Ben Warmath, who was riding for Marks. He took a cup and went to the stream and started to prospect. He worked for but a short time and found a number of nuggets, and also found particles of fine gold. While he was prospecting a band of Indians attacked the corrals and the party had to ride to escape them, leaving their cattle and everything. Warmath never returned. This, too, was in the vicinity described by my uncle, and I believe it is possible that it was the place."
