PIGS, POULTRY AND SEWING CLUBS ARE READY FOR WORK

Boys and Girls of County Showing Renewed Interest in Club Work—Work Being Done all Over County.

This report covers a period of 31 days from March 1st to March 31st, inclusive. The time of the club agent was about equally divided between organizations and follow-up work.

Three enrollment blanks were received in the office this month; Dorcas Sewing Club of Ontario with 11 members, Malheur Pig Club with 6 members and the Vale Poultry club with 12 members. Ontario has organized a poultry club with 10 members, 11 boys at Annex and 14 boys at Brogan have organized pig

clubs.

Pig Clubs
The aim of every pig club member in Malheur County this year is to own one or more pure-bred pigs. Even in the market division pure-breds are generally recommended, because the packers demand quality and quality cannot be fed into scrubs. O. E. Green is the local Leader of the Riverside Pig Club. Every one of the 12 members in this club is planning on securing one or more pure-bred pigs, and most of the members will get a registered gilt. W. N. Worsham will supervise the work of the Malheur Pig Club. It is quite difficult for these members to successfully carry on the work because they live from 4 to 16 miles apart.

Poultry Clubs
There will very probably be four poultry clubs in the county this year. Ontario and Vale have organized clubs, and Valley View and District 68 will complete their organization within the next week. In the poultry club work emphasis is being placed on early hatching and pure-bred chicks.

Home-Making Clubs
There are at present two home-making clubs in the county, one at Riverdale and one at Vale. The club at Riverdale has been organized for three months and is doing some very good work. Mrs. Wilbur Patch is the local leader.

The club at Vale has been organized recently with Mrs. Earl Neely as local leader. Ten high school girls are taking up this project and will carry it on during the summer.

Specialist's Visit
H. C. Seymour, State Club Leader was in the county from March 30th to April 1st inclusive. On Thursday and Friday he met with the clubs at Ontario, Oregon Slope, Jefferson, Riverdale and Big Bend.

Meetings with organized clubs 11, attendance 124; Field meetings 20, attendance 400; Other meetings 59, attendance 71; Personal visits 4; Clubs organized 5, members enrolled 51; Office calls 9; telephone calls 9; news articles for press 21; circular letters 11, copies mailed 237; letters 94; bulletins distributed 11; miles traveled 1320.

Five days was spent in County Agent Work. Two and a half days with extension specialists and the remaining time in securing farm survey reports and attending two community meetings. Three farmer called at the Vale office for information.
