CLUB NOTES

Dairy Herd Record Keeping Club At Vale Finished Work

Thirteen members of the Dairy Herd Record Keeping club at Vale have filed their final reports with the county club agent. Fred Nitzel local leader, met with the boys every two weeks and assisted them with the testing and records. The work consists in scoring two dairy barns and four dairy cows and keeping the butterfat and feed records of two cows for the months of December to April inclusive. Through the co-operation of Mr. Chester, the weight and a sample of milk from eight cows were secured every two weeks. The boys tested the milk and from the weight of the milk and the percent of butterfat found in the milk were able to compute the total number of pounds of butterfat produced by each cow. The production of the cow for the period from December to April, inclusive is a fairly good index on which to base the value of the cow, and together with the feed record determines whether or not she is a valuable animal. The members completing the project are Elton Griffin, Byron Boston, Leslie Lawrence, Roy Beach, Eran Davis, Danton Humphrey, Harry Propst, Everett Hutton, Bannie Clem, Allen Tevebaugh, Ralph Fifer, Ted Knowles and Cecil Mathews.

SAVE MONEY KEEP OUT of JAIL

IT IS COSTLY TO BREAK THE CIGARETTE LAW
LOOK AT THE FOLLOWING:

1.—It is unlawful to sell, offer for sale, keep for sale or give away to any minor any cigarettes, cigarette papers, or any substitute thereof in Oregon. (A minor is any boy under twenty-one years of age and any girl under eighteen years of age.)

PENALTY—First offense not more than \$100.00 fine. Second offense not over \$500.00 nor less than \$25.00 fine, or imprisonment in the county jail not over thirty days, or both fine and imprisonment. Third offense, a jail sentence must be imposed in addition to the fine.

2.—It is unlawful for any minor to smoke, use, or be in possession of any cigarettes. And it is unlawful for any proprietor or employe to permit minors to use cigarettes on their premises.

PENALTY—\$5.00 for each offense.
3.—Minors using cigarettes must tell from whom they were obtained when asked by parent, teacher or officer of the law.

PENALTY—\$5.00 for refusal to give information.

4.—Any officer failing to perform his duty in connection with the cigarette law shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

PENALTY—A fine of not more than \$50.00 nor less than \$10.00.

5.—It is unlawful for any person to purchase cigarettes for minors.

PENALTY—A fine of not more than \$100.00 nor less than \$25.00

For the text of the law see chapter 244, General Laws of Oregon.
