Ralph E. Williams has served as Republican National
Committeeman for Oregon until he is the senior member

By all rules of fair play, because of the work he has
done in the past, he is entitled to re-election.

Having no legitimate reason for opposing his re-election
the opposition has circulated unfair, misleading and poi-
sonous statements.

We do not wish to insult your intelligence or your

has done or may do in an eleventh hour attempt to impose
its poison upon you, there will be no disposition on Mr.
