OBITUARY
Ferman Bradley died Wednesday,
May 10, 1922 at the home of his son
Charles, in Nyssa, after a severe ill-
ness of about 3 months. For nine
weeks he was unable to be down at
all being in bad dropsical condition
and suffering untold misery much of
the time.
Mr. Bradley was born Aug. 31,
1831 in Cambridge, Ohio, thus being
past 90 years of age. He went to
California in 1850, later to Nevada,
then to Utah, where he was married
to Miss Angelina Cram of Salt Lake
City in 1873. To this union were
born 12 children three of whom
survive him.
With his wife he came to Oregon
in 1888, being one year on the Mal-
heur and one at Vale, after which
they came to Owyhee where they
have lived ever since, homesteading
on the Owyhee river. He was a
sincere Christian, being a member
of the Ontario Baptist church for
the past 19 years, and leaves a host
of friends and relatives to mourn
his loss, even though rejoicing that
he is now free from suffering.
Besides his wife, he leaves one
son, Charles, and two daughters,
Mrs. Mattie Matheson of Emmett,
and Mrs. Margaret Pratt, also of
Emmett.
Funeral services were held at
Owyhee school house on Saturday,
May 13, by Rev. Blom of Ontario,
who paid a beautiful tribute to the
life of the deceased. Interment was
made in the Owyhee cemetery.
