**CANYON COUNTY FARMERS COMING TO STUDY WEEVIL**

Farm Bureau Arranges Tour Into Malheur County to See Effects Of Alfalfa Pest and Plan For Combat June 2.

The Canyon County Farm Bureau is arranging a tour into Malheur county to be held on June 2 to investigate the alfalfa weevil. This pest has not yet become general over much of Canyon county like it has in Malheur, Payette and Washington counties, but is gaining foothold quite rapidly. The farmers up that way at least are beginning to worry about it and want to know just what it means to have a real infestation of weevil in their fields. Also they are looking for the best way to control the pest.

The Canyon county caravan will come by way of Nyssa, stopping at a few points along the road to examine fields. They will go as far North as Ontario at which point dinner will be taken in the park near the depot. County agricultural agent Breithaupt is assisting in arranging a short program which will come immediately after the lunch hour, and will cover such points as the life history of the weevil, the rapidity of its increase and extent of damage and various control measures which are recommended. The field entomologist of Idaho is expected to be present and several persons who have had practical experience in fighting alfalfa weevil have been invited to give their views on spraying and other methods.

At 3:00 p. m. a spraying demonstration will be given on the Homer Utley farm just East of town. This demonstration will be put on by Don Whelan of the Idaho Extension Service, who is in charge of alfalfa weevil work in that State. The machine will be a two horse tractor type sprayer such as is now recommended and sold by the Iron Age Company for use on alfalfa, potatoes and other field crops. It covers a wide strip, using liquid spray made of two pounds of calcium arsenate to 100 gallons of water.

The farmers of Malheur county are welcome to attend this meeting and demonstration. Also residents of the town who may wish to do so. Parties may bring basket lunch with them and eat in the park if desired. The program will start about 1 p. m. and the spraying demonstration as noted above at 3 p. m.

**LOCAL MAIL SLINGERS MAKE EXCELLENT RECORDS**

O. Lemon, assistant chief clerk, railway mail service, with headquarters at Pocatello, conducted examinations at the local postoffice in this city on today. H. L. Chapman, Chas. K. Homan and Francis Zimmerman were examined on their knowledge in the distribution of mails for the state of Idaho. There are 591 postoffices in Idaho, and each of these clerks made an excellent record, their rating being above the average of 95 per cent. Mr. Lemon states that the Ontario postoffice is being conducted in a very efficient manner, and the record made by clerks in this office in their examinations indicates a very competent office force.

Mr. Gregg, the postmaster, has observed postal improvement week and has put into operation the very latest and improved methods in the handling of mails. "The people of Ontario are to be congratulated on having an up to date postoffice that is progressive, courteous and efficient," said Mr. Lemon.
