Summary of weather and crop conditions in Eastern Oregon for week ending May 23, 1922. While warmer weather stimulated the growth of all vegetation, it is backward in practically all districts, and farm work as a rule, is still behind the average for the season. All seeding is complete in Malheur county except lettuce, and grains making fine growth. Alfalfa in most sections making fine growth. In Kingman section alfalfa two to two and a half feet high, no noticeable damage from alfalfa weevil. Berries and gardens coming into bearing. Early potatoes making excellent growth. Late potato planting completed.
