JACK LONDON'S "SON OF THE WOLF"

Awild, rough, snow-covered country where might makes right and men are not slow to use their fists furnishes a striking background for Norman Dawn's stirring picturization of Jack London's famous novel "The Son of the Wolf" which has its initial presentation Sun., Mon. and Tues. at the Dreamland Theatre. The story has to do with the adventures of one Scruff Mackenzie, a stout-hearted young man, amid the vast snows of the Northland, and of his love for Chook-Ka, an Indian maid. About these characters has been woven a gripping tale that glows with vitality.

ation of this section for the work of the commission and assured them of the confidence and support of the people.

W. E. Meacham of Baker, outlined the purpose of the Old Oregon Trail association.

Other members of the commissioners' party were: Secretary Roy E. Klein, Division Engineer R. H. Baldock, and Division Engineer Musser. The Portland Oregonian was represented by John Kelley, the Journal by Robert Johnston, and the Telegram by Harry Frye. The commission was met at Unity by W. J. Finney, Ivan E. Oakes and Fred Test. Judge Dodson of Baker county, and Mr. Meacham came here to meet them. Vale was represented at the dinner by District Attorney Robert D. Lytle, Harry Kennard and Lloyd Riches.

In the early morning the commission viewed the interstate bridge and discussed plans for financing a new structure. No definite conclusion was reached and the matter was taken under advisement. They then proceeded to Baker over the Old Oregon Trail.

INDIA'S RIGID CASTE SYSTEM

Religious Laws, Handed Down for Centuries, Are Given Most Implicit Obedience.

The religious laws of Brahmanism divide the Hindu people in India into four principal hereditary classes or castes—the Brahmins (priests), Kshatriyas (rulers and warriors), vaisyas (merchants and husbandmen), and Sudras (mechanics, laborers or servants), the first three being known as "twice-born" and the last as "once-born." These original four castes, however, have become to a great extent sub-divided—the men being known by their work or trades, as the "caste" of shoemakers and the "caste" of sweepers—so that nowadays the Brahmins alone are said to remain as a distinct caste. Aside from all these are the Pariahs (or outcasts) who have no caste. According to the Cyclopaedia of India, "The effect of the caste system is that no man may lawfully eat with any individual of any other caste, or partake of food cooked by him, or marry into another caste family; but he may be his friend, his master, his servant, his partner."

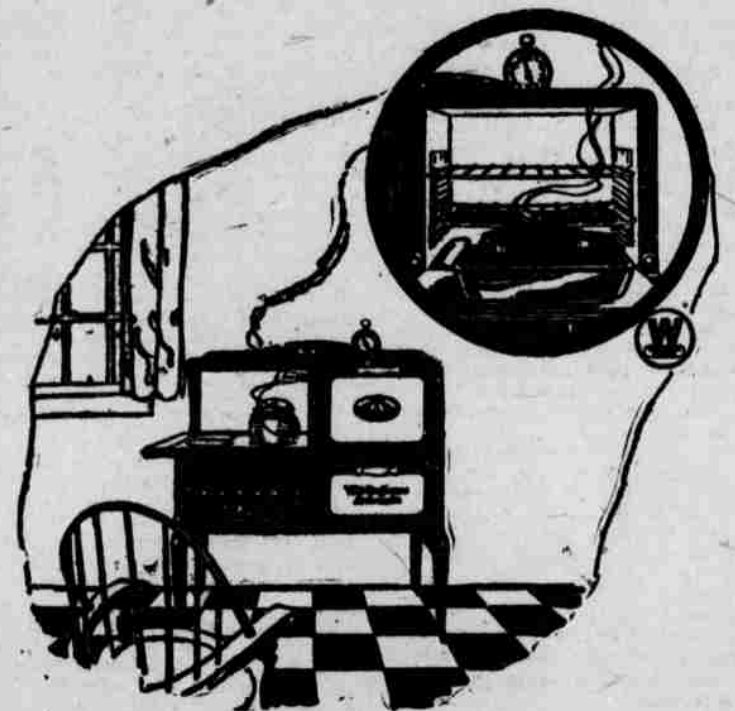
