publications with a circulation running up into millions. Kirk Fox, Waterloo, Ia., represents the Dairy Farmer, another agricultural publication. The Union Pacific System has installed in the special car which brought the party west a press bureau complete even to news photographic dark room for the accommodation of the western press, handling news of the trip to the eastern publications represented, and for the use of correspondents with the party.

Also aiding the work of the party are R. A. Smith, supervisor of agriculture for the Union Pacific System; C. C. Gignoux, assistant supervisor of agriculture; and Joel L. Priest, general agent of the system for Idaho.

H. C. Searles of the party, is head of the dairy husbandry extension department of the University of Iowa. C. W. Larson is head of the dairy division of the department of agriculture at Washington, D. C. J. H. Dorman, head of the bureau of animal husbandry at Washington. Karl B. Musser, secretary of the American Guernsey Club, Peterboro, N. H. E. H. Farrington, head of the department of dairy husbandry of the University of Wisconsin. Reed Murray, secretary of the Wisconsin Livestock Breeders Association. H. A. Harding, head of the dairy research division of the Frederick C. Mathews company of Detroit, also formerly head of the dairy department of the University of Illinois. C. L. Burlingham, president of the Ayreshire Breeders Association at Brandon, Vt., are also in the group of eastern experts. Thma party was met at the Idaho
