NOTICE OF THE INTENTION OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ONTARIO, OREGON, TO IMPROVE THE FOLLOWING STREETS AND AVENUE, TO-WIT: OREGON, RICHARDSON AND VIRTUE STREETS AND TENNESSEE AVENUE, VIZ:
Improving Oregon Street from its intersection with the pavement on Illinois Avenue, north, to its intersection with the Alley north of Blocks Four (4) and Five (5) in Riverside Addition to the said City of Ontario, in the following manner to-wit:

1 By grading said Street to the proper subway.

2 By covering the surface thereof with gravel, for a width of sixteen (16) feet and a depth of five (5) inches.

3 By laying sewer pipes where necessary; by laying concrete headers where necessary.

4 By constructing street monuments where necessary.

5 By constructing street drainage where necessary.

6 By constructing concrete culverts where necessary.

7 By constructing a concrete sidewalk, eight (8) feet in width and a concrete curb, fourteen (14) feet from the property line, on the west side of Block Two (2) and on the east side of Block Eleven (11), in said City of Ontario.

8 By constructing a concrete sidewalk, five (5) feet in width and a concrete curb, fourteen (14) feet from the property line, along the west side of Blocks 1-152-153-154 and 155 and along the east side of Blocks 10-106-107-108 and 109, all in said City of Ontario.

9 By constructing a concrete sidewalk four (4) feet in width on the east side of Block Four (4) in Riverside Addition to said City of Ontario.

10 By constructing concrete curb fourteen (14) feet from the property line along the west side of Blocks Five (5) and Seven (7) and along the east side of Blocks Four (4) and Eight (8) all in said Riverside Addition to said City of Ontario.

Improving Richardson Street by constructing a concrete sidewalk five (5) feet in width along the East side of Block Nineteen (19) in said City of Ontario.

OREGON STREET from its intersection with the pavement on Illinois Avenue, north, to its intersection with the Alley north of Blocks Four (4) and Five (5) in Riverside Addition to the said City of Ontario, in the following manner, to-wit:

1 By grading said Street to the proper subway.

2 By covering the surface thereof with gravel, for a width of sixteen (16) feet and a depth of five (5) inches.

3 By laying sewer pipes where necessary; by laying concrete headers where necessary.

4 By constructing street monuments where necessary.

5 By constructing a street drainage where necessary.

6 By constructing concrete culverts where necessary.

7 By constructing a concrete sidewalk eight (8) feet in width and a concrete curb, fourteen (14) feet from the property line, on the west side of block Two (2) and on the east side of Block Eleven (11) in said City of Ontario.

8 By constructing a concrete sidewalk five (5) feet in width and a concrete curb fourteen (14) feet from the property line, along the west side of Blocks 1-152-153-154 and 155 and along the east side of Blocks 10-106-107-108 and 109, all in said City of Ontario.

9 By constructing a concrete sidewalk four (4) feet in width on the east side of Block Four (4) in Riverside Addition to the said City of Ontario.

10 By constructing a concrete curb fourteen (14) feet from the property line along the west side of Blocks Five (5) and Seven (7) and along the east side of Blocks Four (4) and Eight (8) all in said Riverside Addition to the said City of Ontario.
