They know that it is only a matter of a few days until the "cat" will lash out with its claws unsheathed and rlp the arm of the newcomer. They also know that nothing will teach this type of attendant the alert carefulness necessary in handling wild beasts but an ugly scratching. They can only hope that the man's hurts will be slight. He must have a lesson. He must realize that all animals are dangerous at all times, even if some

are more so than others. One often hears it contemptuously remarked, writes Frank Braden in Popular Mechanics Magazine, that such and such a beast in an act is "just a mangy, toothless old llon," but often that mangy, toothless old llon, because of its rage, is more dangerous than its mates in their prime. The old lion is testy, and no matter what its years, it carries a wallop backed by ripping claws. Some of the world's foremost trainers, working with the same beast In acts year after year, have paid for the slight carelessness that familiarity with and affection for their jungle pets have insidiously brought about. At an unexpected diversion-the overturning a pedestal, for instance-the animals have leaped upon their mentor, but with the element of complete sur prise absent, no real wild-animal expert is caught completely unaware by a beast's leap.





Those of Today.



Steel Has Great Cutting Power. "High-speed steel" for cutting tools has been well known for years, and an improved form of this material has been introduced in Sheffield, England. It is reported that this steel has four times the cutting power of any other in use. The composition is, it appears, still a secret, but it is said to be the first "high-speed steel" that can be hardened in cold water without danger. It can also be hardened with oil or in a cold blast.

Tools made of it wear out much less rapidly and require much less grinding than those of the older kinds of steel. They will also go on working at high temperature longer. But the makers themselves say that this steel does not by any means mark the final development of "highspeed steel."---Washington Star.



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
