PRIMARY ADVOCATES **CONTROL LEGISLATURE**

Boise, Idaho.-The advocates of the statewide primary law have control of Idaho's new legislature, if the pledges of members-elect to the house and senate are kept, and republicans dominate that body. The greatest gain in members over the records of previous years were made by the progressives, who elected five members to the senate and seven members to the house. Progressives and democrats, of whom there are 17 in the senate, are all pledged to the enactment of a primary law and a sufficient number of republicans are pledged to the enactment of such a law to give the primary advocates a clear majority in both houses. The Idaho state republican primary league claims the primary advocates control both the house and the senate.

MAIL FRAUDS ENORMOUS

500 Cases Now Being Investigated by Authorities.

Washington, D. C.-Approximately 500 cases involving fraudulent use of the mails are in the hands of United States attorneys for investigation to determine whether criminal proceedings should be instituted, it was announced at the department of justice.

Officials estimated that the cases already under consideration represented a loss to the American public through postal swindles of more than \$140,000,000.
