SEND CHRISTMAS GIFTS CAREFULLY

So that those sending Xmas gifts to mothers, sweethearts and friends may suffer no loss the Pacific Express and other companies desire to send warnings through the press.

They suggest early shipping and will provide labels to shippers which contain the words "Don't open until Xmas." It is also advised to use wooden boxes for shipping, to write name and full address in box or package as tags are sometimes torn off, to write the word "Paid", if the freight is prepaid, in large letters, to insist on a receipt, to write your own address in full on package, to enclose a card in the package stating from whom and to whom it is sent, to use string paper if boxes are inconvenient and to write the word "perishable" if the contents are of a perishable nature.

NOTICE TO WOOL-GROWERS.

VALE, OREGON, Nov. 17, 1909.
BY THIS NOTICE all members of the Malheur and Harney County Wool-growers' Association are formally notified of the Annual Meeting which will be held at ONTARIO, on Wednesday, December 15, 1909.

For the purpose of election of officers for the ensuing year and the taking up of any business that will benefit the Wool-growers.

By our organized efforts we have maintained the large subsidies on wool, secured a stock bounty law on predatory wild animals, and have before the Interstate Commerce Commission our case for a reduction of freight rates on wool in a few days. There will be present many speakers of prominence on all the vital subjects affecting the industry. This Association will be forced at this meeting to take a stand for or against the raising of the public domain, for the coming Congress contemplating some kind of a grazing law. There are many other matters the above mentioned have a say in, to exact. The meeting at this time will enable us to bring our wants before the National Association, which will be held at Ogden, Utah, on January 6, 7 and 8, of 1910, and to ask their co-operation to secure the same.

The Commercial Club and citizens of Ontario have given us the assurance that they will make it a social success and will promote plenty to eat and drink. In all, it promises to be the most important meeting ever held by your organization, and no one can afford to be absent.
