### NYSSA BRIDGE IS ACCEPTED BY COUNTY

Idaho Man First to Drive Over \$30,000 Steel Structure on Last Saturday—Finest Wagon Bridge Erected by Malheur County—Open to Travel

The new steel bridge over the Snake River at Nyssa, built at a cost of \$30,000, was duly accepted by the county last Saturday when County Judge B. C. Richardson made a minute inspection of the structure with the county bridge engineer, A. E. Fox. "It is the best structure ever put up in this county," said Judge Richardson on his return to this city. "It is built to stay, entirely of steel and with large concrete abutments. It is certainly a fine wagon bridge. An Idaho man was the first person to drive over the bridge, coming over in a single rig as we were inspecting the bridge. The people of Nyssa are now putting the dirt approach on the Oregon side."

### DEAD OX FLAT BRIDGE TO BE COMPLETED EARLY

The arrival of the two cars of steel at Payette that have been side tracked for over a month on the line of the Union Pacific in Wyoming, Saturday afternoon, enabled the bridge gang that has been tied up for about ten days to go to work Monday morning with a full force. The work is to be rushed to completion. Mr. A. J. Brown, one of the company's experts from Minneapolis, is here to overcome the difficulties encountered in sinking the caissons through the shale to bed rock.—Payette Enterprise.

### LARGE ORDER OF PIPE IN FOR PROJECT

Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation Company Expects to Have Project Completed by March 20th—Water for Irrigation of 8000 Acres of Rich Land

The Ontario-Nyssa Irrigation company has placed an order for 4074 feet of five-foot pipe for their irrigation system to bring the water from Snake River to the main ditch. This will carry sufficient water to irrigate about 8000 acres of land without material friction. The cost of this pipe is \$24,774. This price includes the cost of installing and the contract provides that the pipe shall all be in place and ready for testing by March 20.

### SHEAVILLE MAN WEDS NURSE IN LOS ANGELES

The culmination of a romance that had its inception near old Fort Lyon on the state line between Idaho and Oregon 24 months ago came Christmas Day in Los Angeles, when the principals, Mary L. Lineman, a trained nurse, and Governor C. Knight, a wealthy stock man of Sheaville, this county were married at the rectory of St. Vincent's cathedral.

Early in June, 1919, while riding the range in search of a stray band of cattle, young Knight suffered a sudden attack of appendicitis. So intense was the pain that he fell from his saddle. The nearest surgeon was in Boise, a distance of 70 miles. In Boise it was found that the only available nurse was Miss Lineman. From Caldwell, the nearest town on the railroad, 50 miles from the Knight ranch, the surgeon and nurse set out in an automobile. When 20 miles of the distance was covered the machine broke down. Miss Lineman rode backward the remaining 40 miles of the trip over an unknown and poorly marked trail. She saw an operation was imperative and made the necessary preparations. After two months of nursing Knight was restored to health and the nurse departed for Elko, Nev., to pursue her profession, and later went to Los Angeles.

### ONTARIO SENDS DELEGATION TO SALT LAKE CITY

F. P. O'Neill, of Ontario, was in town Wednesday to see what there was going along in the way of railroad construction work in this city. He stated that Ontario people were up in arms, excited over the present railroad talk of a cut-off from the new town of Malheur, over in the Owyhee country, to the mouth of the Malheur canyon. The delegates from Ontario to Salt Lake were Mayor Trow and Banker J. E. Blackaby. Mr. O'Neill is a good booster for the Malheur valley and says that the people of Vale and Ontario and also the ranchers of the valley should be united in the effort of securing the main line of the Oregon Eastern to pass through Vale and Ontario. He believes the benefits will more than repay the people of this section.
