BEN SELLING SAVED PEOPLE FROM PANIC

When Bank Failed He Promptly Offered Par for Pass Books.

Loan Sharks and Brokers Thwarted By Him—Saved People Large Sums.

"Help promptly is of double value," says the proverb. Oregon people, and Portland people in particular, will remember the failure of the Title Guarantee and Trust company, of Portland, in October, 1907. The embarrassment of that institution was bad enough of itself. But it came at a time when the breaking of one bank came perilously near producing a panic in which many banks and business houses must go down—to the measureless damage of thousands.

It was a time for men to help each other; a time for business interests to stand together in order to save depositors from a heavy loss. Disastrous as a settlement of material discount would have been, it was feared for a time that it was the best settlement that could be made. And if made, it certainly would have resulted in widespread and ruinous loss to thousands all over Oregon. In that crisis Ben Selling promptly came forward with a better offer. He proposed to take over the claims of the depositors at seventy-five cents on the dollar in good, solid cash, and an additional twenty-five cents in merchandise. It was absolutely equivalent to a hundred cents on the dollar—every penny that was involved.

There was an instance of needed help promptly given. It averted a threatened and imminent panic. It restored the general confidence in banks and business houses. It absolutely insured depositors against loss, did more than any other one thing to enable commercial Portland to ride the troubled seas of 1907—the most dangerous period since 1896. And it was typical of Ben Selling. It required financial resources, splendid judgment of conditions, and a superb confidence in the essential stability of his city and his state, and the fairness of his fellow citizens.

WHAT BILL HANLEY THINKS OF BEN SELLING

"Oregon for Oregon" is the slogan of William Hanley, the picturesque representative of Central Oregon, who, because of his marked facial and physical resemblance to William Jennings Bryan, has many times been mistaken for the thrice-defeated candidate of the Democracy for the presidency. It is for the reason of "Oregon for Oregon" and because Hanley's views coincide closely with those of Ben Selling, candidate for the Republican nomination for United States senator, that Hanley feels very friendly toward the candidacy of Selling.

Hanley came out of the Selling head quarters yesterday looking cheerful reflecting that Mr. Selling in his plot or had definitely committed himself to securing for Oregon its just share of the reclamation fund for promoting various irrigation projects in this state. Mr. Hanley said it would be advisable for the voters of this state to elect a senator who could be depended upon to do all in his power to secure for the state all that belonged to it in the way of money for organizing and completing irrigating enterprises.

"Up to the present time the state of Oregon is short about \$8,000,000 of a part of the reclamation fund, money that should have been used for the construction of irrigation projects in his state and which money was actually given to other states," said Mr. Hanley.

"Mr. Selling is pledged to the recovery of that money for use here, and if anybody can do it I am convinced that he will at least lend his best efforts in that direction. My acquaintance of several years with Mr. Selling has convinced me that he always has stood square-toed in the front for Oregon interests and it is about time we had such a representative at Washington."—From a Portland newspaper.

HARRIMAN TO START WORK ON COOS BAY END

Marshfield, April 1.—The Evening Times says: That the Southern Pacific is planning to begin construction on this end of the Coos Bay-Eugene line early this spring is the news that Frank B. Waite of Sutherland brought here today. Mr. Waite arrived on the Breakwater this morning to look after business interests on the bay.

While in San Francisco recently, Mr. Waite visited the Southern Pacific officials. At the office of Chief Engineer Hood, he was given to understand that construction would be started on the Coos Bay end of the line this spring and that it would be rapidly pushed to completion.

JESSE THOMPSON

Whose recent tragic death, through the accidental discharge of a rifle, has been already announced by the county press, was born in Crawford county Illinois, Aug. 6, 1862. He was the sixth in a family of seven—five boys and two girls. In 1868, when Jesse was only six, his father died, leaving the care and support of the family to the mother; a woman of unusual strength of character, who, living with her children on rented farms, contrived by industry and good business sense to support her family and keep her children together. In order to better the family fortunes she removed to Kansas, the most western state in the union, in 1868; where, after two years of pioneer life, she passed into the larger life in the Beyond. Five years after his fathers death, in 1875, Jesse crossed the plains by the overland route into Oregon where he labored at an honest work that came to his hand, till 1883, when he and his brother, Elias, came to the Agency Valley, and located the fine ranch on which the two brothers have accumulated a fortune. By strict integrity, industry, and honest dealing, they not only made a home, but warm friends all over the county.

He is survived by a sister and two brothers: Mrs. H. M. Sutherland of Mountainhome, Idaho; John S. Thompson of Jasper, Mo.; and Elias Thompson of Beulah. A cousin, J. B. Stanfield of Mountainhome, with his family constitute the only remaining near relatives living west of the Rocky Mountains.
