**FRUITS GUAGED**  
A housewife who has made careful records of the amount of fruit she has used for preserving or jelly making, keeping at the same time, a record of the amount after the canning cooking process, says that five boxes of currants will yield nine glasses of jelly.  
Seven pounds of peaches will make 15 glasses of marmalade.  
Four quarts of quinces will make 10 glasses of jelly.  
Four quarts of crabapples will make 10 glasses of jelly.  
Six pounds of peaches will make eight pint jars of preserved peaches.  
Four pounds of plums will make five pint jars of preserves.—Newark News.
