LAND FRAUD IN HARNEY AND MALHEUR

Burns Lawyer Confering With Attorney-General

Salem.—C. B. McConnell, a lawyer of Burns, conferred with Attorney-General Crawford in regard to instituting suits for the recovery by the state of large tracts of grazing land in Harney and Malheur counties, control of which Mr. McConnell charges was obtained by fraud. Suit is pending against the Pacific Livestock company for the recovery of 27,000 acres of school land. The company has entered suit to prevent the adjudication of water rights on the Silvies river, and it was while making an investigation of its allegations that Mr. McConnell says he found that about 50,000 other acres had been obtained through fraud.

AUSTRIAN DEFEAT IN RUSSIAN POLAND

Rome.—The Messagero publishes a telegram from Sofia, Bulgaria, which says the Austrians have suffered an irreparable defeat at Zamoste, in Russian Poland, 50 miles southeast of Lublin.

STATE MILITIA IS ORDERED TO BUTTE

Helena, Mont.—Governor Stewart ordered the immediate mobilization of the entire state militia, consisting of ten companies, as a result of the renewal at Butte of factional troubles among the miners.

Governor Stewart also telegraphed Senators Walsh and Evans asking their aid in having federal troops from Vancouver barracks brought into the state and held in readiness in the event the state militia was not able to cope with the situation.

Butte.—Miners openly threatened to lay the town in ashes if either state or federal troops attempted to enter Butte. One of the leaders of the miners declared that they do not intend to fight, but would wreak vengeance upon the business men for having been instrumental in bringing soldiers to Butte.
