CITY PICTURE SHOWS
The Norwegian Diet recently pass-
ed a law providing that the licenses of
all motion picture theaters in Nor-
way shall expire in 1915. The cities
may then renew the licenses or estab-
lish municipal picture shows. Many
of the cities propose to show educa-
tional films in municipalized theaters.
Thinking as they do, perhaps the sur-
plus earnings of the theaters will in-
crease the city revenues. The propri-
etors of the motion picture houses will
lose their businesses without com-
pensation, although some of the cities
are extending the time for cancelling
the licenses until 1918.
