Uncle Sam's Bureau of Census shows that up to the last accounting, the close of 1913, 2,500 American mu-

nicipalities had an aggregate bonded debt of \$2,844,883,000, or \$54.27 per capita, the largest ever recorded in

The same report shows that the per capita bonded debt of counties was only \$5.33 per capita, states \$3.47 and the nation \$10.59.

For the decade-1902-1913-this meant an increase in city debt of 104 per cent, county 89 per cent and states 44.5, while only 6 per cent for the national government.

This enormous increase of city indebtedness is largely due to the growth of municipal development in that period and it is naturally and wisely being held up now as a warning to those in charge of civic affairs to call a halt.
