ENORMOUS GAIN IN CITY DEBT Uncle Sam's Bureau of Census shows that up to the last accounting, the close of 1913, 2,500 American municipalities had an aggregate bonded debt of \$2,844,883,000, or \$54.27 per capita, the largest ever recorded in this country.

The same report shows that the per capita bonded debt of counties was only \$5.33 per capita, states \$3.47 and the nation \$10.59.

For the decade—1902-1913—this meant an increase in city debt of 104 per cent, county 89 per cent and states 44.5, while only 6 per cent for the national government.
