### NOTICE OF ELECTION

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, That a special election has been duly called by the Board of Directors of the Warm Springs Irrigation District, to be held at the following named polling places within said District:

Division No. 1, at the Grove School House;  
 Division No. 2, at the Star School House;  
 Division No. 3, at the "Old Mill";  
 Division No. 4, at the Mallet School House;  
 Division No. 5, at the residence of C. E. S. Wood, in section 13, T. 18 S., Range 46 E.; the boundaries of said divisions being described in the Order of the County Court dated May 29, 1916; said election to be held on the 15th day of August, 1916, between the hours of 8 o'clock a. m., and 5 o'clock p. m., of said day, to determine the question of issuing Seven Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000) gold bonds, to bear interest at a rate not to exceed 6 per cent per annum, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 189 of the 1915 session laws of Oregon.

The said bonds to be designated "Warm Springs Irrigation District Improvement Bonds, Series No. 1." Five per cent of which shall be payable in 21 years, and thereafter as provided in section 7 of said act, and all payable at the expiration of 30 years. The proceeds of the sale of said bonds to be used in the construction of a storage system for irrigation as adopted by the said Board, and thereafter for the improvement of the distribution system as planned, copies of the general plan of which are to be found with the Secretary of the said Board at its office in Vale, Oregon.

At said election the question shall be submitted to the legal voters of the said District as follows:

"Shall the Warm Springs Irrigation District issue for sale Seven Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000) gold bonds, bearing interest at a rate not greater than six per cent per annum, for the construction and improvements of the storage and distribution systems of the district?"

### RESOLUTION

RESOLVED: That for the purpose of formulating a general plan of the proposed works for storage and for the improvement of the distribution system of the waters of the Malheur River for the irrigation of lands included within the Warm Springs Irrigation District, the surveys, examinations and plans heretofore made by the Co-operative Engineers and adopted in the alternative by this Board, the Board now finds the general plan herein shown to be most practical, and, subject to such change or modification as the progress and experience of installation may disclose, economy and efficiency considered, the same is hereby adopted. And it is hereby determined that said survey, examination and report furnish a proper basis for an estimate of the cost of carrying out the said plans.

### PLAN FOR IMPROVEMENT WARM SPRINGS IRRIGATION DISTRICT Storage

It is proposed to construct a dam for the purpose of creating a reservoir for the storage of 159,000 acre feet of water at a point near the center of the Southwest quarter of Section 8, in township 23 S., R. 37 E., W.M., the necessary site for which is to be acquired.

The dam shall be of gravity type, as shown on File No. 815 of the Engineer's Report, and shall be 84.5 feet in height above low water and as described on pages 77 and 78 of said report.

The cost of the structure, including the cost of the site, administration charges and engineering charges shall be as estimated in said report as near as may be, \$389,280.

This cost, to be called "Storage Charge," will be distributed to the various units embraced within the boundaries of the Warm Springs Irrigation District as follows:

OLD LANDS are those lands with rights to the normal flow of the river and which have been using certain amounts of same.  
 NEW LANDS are those which have no rights except such as may be created by this organization, and their inclusion within the boundaries thereof.

### PROPOSED BOND ISSUE

For the purpose of providing funds for the construction of the proposed dam and distribution system herebefore described, and more particularly set forth in the Engineers' Report as adopted by the Board of Directors, the WARM SPRINGS IRRIGATION DISTRICT, through its Board of Directors, under the laws of Oregon for 1915, Chapter 189, Section 7 thereof, should issue and dispose of SEVEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS, par value, interest bearing gold bonds of date January 1, 1917, said bonds to bear interest at a rate not to exceed six per cent per annum, payable semi-annually. Said bonds to mature as follows:

### LOW RATE, LONG-TIME EUROPEAN CREDIT SYSTEM

"The standard length of time in Europe for a long-time loan is 54 years. For such a loan at the present time the rate is 4.85 per cent divided as follows: interest, 4 per cent, administration, .35 per cent and amortization (payment on principal), .50 per cent. This rate will pay both principal and interest and will repay all charges due to the bank in 54 years. As this will seem almost incredible to some

students, I will give a concrete illustration of how it works. It does not depend upon compound interest, but upon the fact that though the rate of yearly payment remains the same, the charge for interest and administration is constantly decreasing because they are computed on the principal sum which is constantly being repaid. So therefore, the proportion which is applied toward the repayment of the principal is always increasing.

"For illustration, if the debt were \$1,000 the debtor will pay \$24.25 ev-

ery six months. Of the first payment \$20 will go for interest, \$1.75 belongs to the bank and \$2.50 is applied to the repayment of the principal. When the debt is half discharged, however, this distribution will be greatly changed. The borrower will pay \$24.25 as usual; of this amount, only \$10 will go for interest, 88 cents will be retained by the bank, while \$13.37 will be applied to the discharge of the principal. The final payment will be almost wholly devoted to the payment of the principal as the first went largely to the payment of interest. In this way, one-half of 1 per cent will repay the principal in 54 years, provided a constant payment is maintained on the principal for interest during the entire period.

### FRESH AIR AND GOOD FOOD MAKE SOLDIERS FAST AND FURIOUS

Port Royal, S. C., July 31—Plain, wholesome food, fresh air and regular hours caused the recruits of the Ninth Drill Company of the United States Marine Corps, in training here at the recruit depot, to gain almost seven pounds to the man, after fourteen weeks of instruction. This company of 56 men weighed, upon enlistment, 8,076 pounds and at the end of fourteen weeks training it increased to 8,467 pounds, a gain of 391 pounds.

This same company had a chest capacity, upon enlistment, of 11,909 cubic inches and, after fourteen weeks, had increased it to 13,295 cubic inches; a gain of 1,386 cubic inches. The physical gain of the company was 38 per cent.

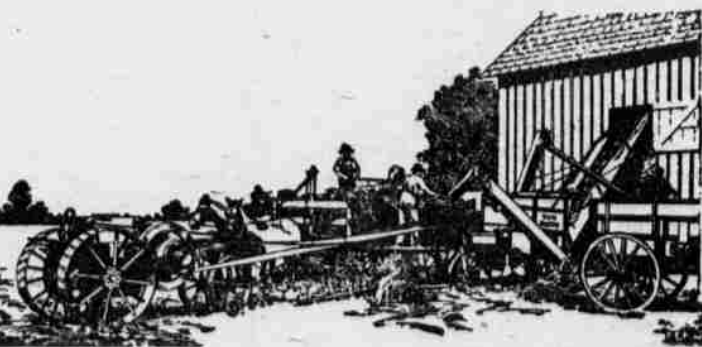
