HEALTH INSURANCE \$25,000,000 A YEAR

C ALIFORNIA compulsory Health Insurance Commission will report a bill to the legislature to raise by taxation a fund to pay medical bills, care and part wages of laborers when not well.

Funds are to be raised, 50 per cent by state, 40 per cent by employers, and 10 per cent from employes who get \$100 a month or less.

It is estimated sickness costs California laborers \$25,000,000 a year.

At hearings held by this Commission labor representatives, while favoring health insurance at public expense, opposed paying any part of it.

Fraternal orders objected on grounds that they already tax themselves to insure their members, pay their medical bills and attending physicians and benefits.

Medicine, doctor bills and other benefits are to go under this bill, to laboring men, their wives, children and other members of their families when sick or out of work.

It is expected that Christian Scientists and some other systems of healing will object to being taxed for any scheme of health insurance.

Insurance against sickness and non-employment will be brought before other western leg-
