

Farmers Will Form Loan Association in Vale Saturday .-- Many Already Promised to Join.

There will be a meeting in Vale, Saturday, April 7th, of a large number of farmers of the valley for the purpose of organizing a Nationa Farm Loan Association.

There are about 25 who have already signified their intention of going into the matter and endeavor to place long time loans on their prop erty at a low rate of interest.

It is proposed to include the territory from the section line two miles north of Nyssa and bounded on the east by Snake River, on the north by Malheur River and to go far enough west to include the lands under the Nevada ditch, Owyhee and "Shoe string ditches as far south as the said section line. This will make it possible to organize a compact territory and also make it possible to organize other associations with Nyssa and Vale as center, says W. W. Howard,
