BOOZE AND PRISONERS.

The following article is from "Lend A Hand" a little magazine published by the bonafide members of the O. S. P. at Salem, Oregon. This, a criminal's own arraignment of booze as a crime producer, is especially worthy of mention.

That liquor is responsible for a majority of murders committed seems to be an indisputable fact, again referring to prison statistics. During the year 1912 eighteen men were received at this prison sentenced to life or execution. In 1913 the number was eleven; in 1914, thirteen; in 1915, ten while in 1916, immediately following the abolishment of saloons four were sent here for life, three of them guilty and one railroaded.

Following are figures comparing general receipts for the years indicated, a standing indictment against booze which cannot be refuted: Received in 1915, last year before prohibition, 283; in 1916, the first year of prohibition in Oregon, 151; in first seven months of 1917, only 85.

The argument that \$300,000,000 a year is lost in revenue tax is the last leg the wets have on which to stand, and that is easily knocked off when the fact is taken into consideration that the nation's crime bill is \$1 billion dollars annually. Allowing that booze is responsible for only half that amount, there is still a handsome profit left after subtracting the \$300,000,000 lost revenue tax.

There is absolutely no excuse for saloons or liquor, and bootlegging can be abolished any time the courts see fit to make it unprofitable.

Y. M. C. A. WOULD MAKE SOLDIERS CLEAN AND FIT.

The National War Work Council of the Young Men Christian Association in conjunction with the United States government is trying to make conditions for these men clean and wholesome, trying to make them real soldiers, sending big men into training camps to appeal to their manhood and Americanism that the army we send against the foe may be fit.

Wherever the enlisted men of the United States army are sent, the Y. M. C. A. will follow. It will be with them in the training camps, on the ocean, in concentration camps, and at the front. It will be the nearest approach to home that the million lads called into service in this country will know once they are away from the family circle.

This organization is today serving the enlisted men through a corps of trained secretaries stationed at military camps, with splendid equipment for the use of the soldiers, clean welcome quarters where they may write letters home or find entertaining reading.

Recognizing the need of raising an army that could be sent to the front one hundred per cent efficient, the government has banished the disolute woman five miles from any military camp, it has made it a crime to give a soldier liquor and it is striving with the assistance of the Y. M. C. A. to throw a protecting arm about the million men summoned to the colors.

And it is to look after the well being of these men that the National War Council of the Y. M. C. A. is securing the biggest men it can find to go into the training camps to appeal to the soldiers, to point out to them the necessity for following a clean life, to make conditions in the training camp or wherever the enlisted man may be, so welcome, so inviting, so appealing that he will find his pleasures there and not seek influences that would tend to rob him of his manhood and his honor.

Wherever enlisted men are sent there will follow the Red Triangle of the Y. M. C. A. to which they may turn for recreation. On the Pacific Coast the work is under the supervision of F. A. McCarl, executive secretary of the Western department.

This publication is compiled and printed by authority of Chapter 133, General Laws of Oregon. Prior editions of the Blue Book, with the exception of the 1915-1916 edition, were voluntary complications of this office, but following the great demand from all sections of the state from those engaged in practically every walk of life, especially the school children, teachers, and county school superintendent, for a general state reference book, this department secured the enactment of the law authorizing the biennial compilation and publication of an official state Blue Book or directory of all state officers, state institutions, etc.

Every official activity in the state is covered. Facts relating to the functions of practically every foreign, federal and state department operating in Oregon are included. In addition there is much valuable information relating to taxation, political registration and the vote cast at the later general state elections, a compiled summary of the vote upon initiative and referendum measures since the adoption of these popular instruments of government, besides other miscellaneous information relating to the political history of the state.

The list of postoffices in Oregon has been compiled from the latest United States Postal Guide. The list of newspapers of the state has been compiled and brought down to date by Mr. E. E. Brodie, past president of the Oregon State Editorial Association.

Among the added features are the Declaration of Independence, the United States Constitution, the acts of congress relating to the admission of Oregon as a state, and a synopsis of the federal naturalization laws prepared by Mr. Henry B. Hazard, United States naturalization examiner.

The Blue Book is issued at the earliest date possible following the making effect of new laws and other changes affecting the official personnel and policies of the state due to the biennial sessions of the legislature and changes of administration.
