IT PAYS DEALERS TO ADVERTISE ADVERTISED GOODS SAYS MANUFACTURER.

If a dealer nowadays sells goods that the manufacturers advertise, his sales work is greatly simplified. In the farm machine business, where almost everything good is advertised to farmers through the farm papers, the dealer can help himself tremendously by using the local paper to let the farmers know what lines of advertised goods he carries.

No matter how willing or anxious the manufacturer or national distributor may be to send customers to the dealer, he cannot send them to any individual dealer. The manufacturer's advertising, by creating a desire for his machines in the farmer's mind certainly makes it easier for the dealer to sell those machines. You all know how much easier it is to sell a farmer something he wants and asks for than to get him to take something else. In practically every case it is the manufacturer's advertising, in some form, that suggests the purchase of a machine to a farmer.

This fact answers the remark of another correspondent who said, "You have no right to ask a dealer to advertise your goods. That's your job." We never ask a dealer to advertise our goods, replies the Harvester World of the I. H. C. That is our job, and we take care of it to the best of our ability. What we do ask of the dealer is that he advertise his store as the place where our goods and other advertised goods are on sale. When our advertising has created a desire for one of our machines in a farmer's mind—and it certainly does—the most valuable bit of information that farmer can get is to know where he can see that machine. The dealer who handles the line is the only man who can tell him and the local paper is possibly the best medium he can use.

At the average price for space in weekly newspapers, it costs about one-fourth of a cent per farmer to deliver a message through the local paper. You are not advertising our goods when you do that. You are advertising yourself. At the same time you are getting the benefit of our advertising and that of every manufacturer whose advertised goods you carry and you are cutting down your overhead expense by increasing the number of sales you make in any given time.

PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATIONS.

The railroads are increasing their efficiency in many lines; yet discriminatory rates and disregarded schedules, together with apparent unconcern of the public's needs and conveniences prevent the citizens of interior Oregon from becoming wildly enthusiastic over the displayed patriotism of the railroad management that serves this territory.

The President is still on the job; but can a business of 110,000,000 stockholders representing an investment of hundreds of billions of dollars, when in the midst of a \$21,000,000,000 enterprise, afford to give an extended vacation to its board of directors?
