COAL SHORTAGE ACUTE
RAILROADS LACK MOTIVE POWER

The fuel situation is becoming a mighty serious matter in Malheur County. No section has a sufficient supply, nor prospects for a sufficient supply of fuel.

We are not making any fuss, so to speak, but the sooner the American government, the American people and the railroads can factor on the war perplexities in connection with transportation the better for all concerned.

Due to lack of motive power the average haul for a loaded car of coal from Utah to Oregon is 20 miles per day, apparently at that is requires from a month to six weeks after issuance of a bill of lading before delivery.

Due to intense interest in pushing the main issue, the government has been overlooking, ignoring and sometimes crushing local and personal rights.

Due to the supreme necessity of an increased earning power to meet the high cost of living, even on a Hooverized basis, the American people, laborer, employer, merchant, professional, farmer and every class have been applying too much individualism and provincialism to their patriotism.

The only basis for a speedy and equitable remedy for much injustice and more inefficiency is a proper appreciation of one another's necessities and obligations. In order to maintain the proper amount of cooperation from the people to the administration, that is not actual personal sacrifice not mere proclaimed patriotism, the government must adjust its war program to include America as well as Europe.

It is of course paramount that war supplies, munitions, etc, have the right of way as far as required and that no time be lost in transportation from factory to port and from port to Europe.

Getting down to brass tacks, the railroads are not capable of handling this war emergency. Nor is it all their fault. Unfair and unscientific rates based on a competitive instead of a cost system is responsible for the present shortage of cars, motive power and system.

Government ownership or control, something, is necessary that will eliminate unnecessary and expensive mileage, that will secure a satisfactory distribution and minimum supply of cars, that will provide for sufficient motive power to prevent long delays of loaded cars and accumulation of vast amounts of freight in yards, that will be able to handle all classes of freight with proper dispatch and please both the people and the government with honest to goodness service.

Nothing in a long time has shocked the people of Vale and Malheur county as the death of John Rigby. The last years of his life, the mature ability of a great man, the full expenditure of a vast store of conserved energy, all have been faithfully, ably and tirelessly devoted to the development of this community.

John Rigby is dead, yet his work will be continued to a successful completion. It has been his dream to transform the sagebrush wastes in the Malheur River basin to a thickly populated and a vast productive irrigated region.

Mr. Rigby saw the little towns become fine cities, the dusty roads, graveled and paved, the cabin schools large and modernized and neighbors close together enjoying life and prosperity.

Secretary Rigby organized the districts, won over the farmers, convinced the big land companies, proposed a bond sale and in every act and particular he has been sustained by the circuit and supreme courts of this district and state.

However, his work has been so well done, his foundations are so sure, it is certain that someone will be found who can now carry on the work of actual construction.

We say John Rigby is dead; yet as long as mankind inhabits the broad acres of Malheur county the spirit of John Rigby will greet them in every improvement, every advancement. The crowning achievement in life is that one's deeds will live to be remembered.
